Article 2: (By Petition) Do you favor the continuation of the town manager plan as now in force in this town?

458 Yes, 139 No

Passed – The existing Town Manager form of government will continue.

Article 3: (By Petition) Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment of the Town of Enfield Zoning Ordinance as follows? Reword the responsibilities of the Conservation Commission by amending ARTICLE VI – CONSERVATION MANAGEMENT, Section 600 CONSERVATION COMMISSION to read: "The Conservation Commission for the Town of Enfield shall have the responsibility for identifying the natural resources within its boundaries, protecting those already established, working to enhance existing areas and to conserve new areas as they become available. Natural resources include, but are not limited to, the following categories: wildlife and wildlife corridors and habitats, water quality, unique geological features such as waterfalls, wetlands and bogs, vernal pools, rivers and streams, escarpments, sensitive areas, views and trails."

The Planning Board does not recommend this article by a vote of 6-0

Buildings & Grounds Maintainer

The Town of Enfield, NH, is seeking a full-time Buildings and Grounds Maintainer (B&G Maintainer). Enfield is a community of approximately 4,600 permanent residents (the population increases substantially with seasonal residents during the summer months), situated in the Upper Valley Region approximately 10-20 minutes from the population centers of Lebanon and Hanover (home of Dartmouth College and the renowned Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center) and only two hours from Boston. Enfield is an attractive community with a wide range of local businesses, a proud Shaker cultural heritage, two large scenic lakes, and an abundance of open space.

The B&G Maintainer position is 40 hours per week, year-round and is available immediately. The position reports to the Buildings and Grounds Leader as well as the Highway Supervisor (winter months only). Duties primarily include the maintenance and upkeep of town buildings, grounds, parks, and cemeteries. On occasion, duties will involve assisting other public works divisions including highways, water/sewer and solid waste and recycling. The position is shared with the Highway Division during the winter maintenance season. The successful candidate will possess at least a high school diploma and two years of full-time work experience, with a minimum of one year of full-time work experience in buildings and/or grounds maintenance, or related field. Knowledge of and experience with relevant trades (carpentry, plumbing, electrical, and/or small engine repair) is highly desirable. A basic level of computer proficiency is preferred. The successful candidate will also be able to perform physical work outside in all weather and lift at least 50 pounds.

Starting pay rate will be \$14.50-\$17.00/hour depending on experience. The Town of Enfield offers an excellent benefits package to full-time employees including health insurance, dental insurance, New Hampshire Retirement System, deferred compensation plan, and generous paid leave.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Spring is here and with the warmer weather comes the return of active wildlife. Every spring we get many calls about bear sightings. To help prevent the bears from developing bad habits, please bring in bird feeders, ensure your trash cans are secured, and pickup any trash that may be in the yard. As a kind reminder, Town Ordinance states that trash should not be placed curbside until the evening prior to pick up, and the receptacles removed from the curb the same day the pickup is completed. This ordinance is especially helpful in the springtime as it limits the time your trash cans are vulnerable to become a bear picnic.

In the month of April, the police department will participate in directed patrol for "U Drive, U Text, U Pay" campaign. The department will conduct extra patrols focusing on drivers who are using cell phones as they drive. Please be safe and put away your phone when you drive. As the weather gets better more people will be out walking and biking in our community. Please pay attention to your surrounding as you drive and watch out for those who are using the community resources and enjoying the weather.

The police department has recently received several complaints regarding littering on several secondary roads. The department will be conducting investigations and issuing fines if needed. If you see a vehicle throwing trash out, please contact the department at 603-632-7501 or through Hanover dispatch at 603-643-2222. We encourage all members of the community to be proud of our Town and help keep it clean. The department will also be using the radar trailer again this year around town. LAND USE AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) held no hearings in March. The ZBA is set to welcome two new members at their next meeting on April 13th. Congratulations go out to Celie Aufiero and Brian Degnan who were elected on the March 9th ballot. They will be replacing Tim Lenihan and Mike Diehn. The Town wishes to thank Tim and Mike for their service on the board and for their many hours of volunteer time in multiple roles on the ZBA including the chair's seat for both.

The ZBA meeting on April 13th will have a hearing for a proposed new cell tower project. This is Enfield Land Use Case #Z21-04-01. Vertex Towers, LLC will request a special exception to Enfield's Zoning Ordinance to allow for the construction of a wireless tower on property owned by the John E. Mann Trust (John E. Mann, Trustee) in the northwest corner of Enfield. The property is located off US Route 4 and Morhouse Lane on Town Tax Map 14, Lot 11A. The applicant is also requesting a variance to Enfield's Zoning Ordinance to allow the tower to be higher than the prescribed 10 ft above average tree canopy limitation. The applicant also requests a variance to Enfield's Zoning Ordinance that limits a telecommunications tower or antenna over 70 feet in height from being located within two miles of an existing tower or antenna over 70 feet in height, whether or not such existing tower is located within the Town of Enfield. Many of Enfield's residents will know firsthand the cell signal problems that begin on Route 4 near "Dry Bridge Hill" headed towards Lebanon and don't resolve until one nears Exit 17 in Lebanon. This new tower is proposed to solve that problem as well as the Route 4A limited signal strength near Lake Mascoma. The ZBA meeting will be held virtually via Zoom. The Planning Board (PB) held a hearing on Wednesday, March 24th at 7:00 pm via the Zoom web meeting platform. This hearing was to approve a minor subdivision for Robert (Bob) LaCroix on US Route 4 and Lovejoy Brook Road. On April 14th the Planning Board will hear Enfield Land Use Case #P21-04-02. Thomas Jellison is applying for minor subdivision reapproval to edit the language of his original subdivision approval dated 9/9/1987. Specifically, he is asking to remove wording that has precluded his ability to access his property from Old County Road (a class VI road). The subject property is 2 acres in total and is located between Morhouse Lane and the Old County Road at Tax Map 14, Lot 35-1. The lot is owned by the Thomas M. Jellison. The Town's Master Planning Task Force continues to meet twice a month on the second and fourth Mondays. This committee is tasked with assisting the Planning Board to facilitate a completely new and overdue Master Plan for the Town. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Water/Sewer Rate Changes

Effective January 1, 2021 the water and sewer user charges were increased. The water usage rate for both consumption charges and fixed charges has been increase by 5%. On the sewer side only the consumption charges have been increased by 8%. The rate chart is available on the Town Website at the following link.

Water and Sewer Bills

Brush and Yard Waste

The Enfield Brush and Yard Waste Recycling Facility is scheduled to reopen on May 1, 2021. The facility can take clean brush and limbs up to 8" and leaves and yard waste. The Town cannot take any invasive plant species, stumps or dimensional lumber. Residents wishing to use the facility must stop at the DPW office or the Transfer Station to have all loads checked by Town staff. The facility cannot take commercial volumes.

Arbor Day

The Town of Enfield has declared April 30, 2021 Arbor Day. The Town will be planting a tree in one of the parks or cemeteries to mark the day. Arbor Day is an important part of the Tree City Program that Enfield has participated in since 2009.

Road Postings

The Town of Enfield posted all roads effective March 8, 2021. The State of New Hampshire posted Shaker Hill Road and Main Street. Limited permission for access will be available on a case-by-case basis with factors such as weather, truck size, time of day, etc., being taken into consideration. Please contact the DPW Director at 603-632-4605 or <u>jtaylor@enfield.nh.us</u> with any questions. Those wishing to access Main Street or Shaker Hill Road should call the NH DOT District 2 office at 448-2654. It is expected that the posting will begin to be lifted in mid to late April.

Aerosol cans, empty: Recycle with scrap metal. Talk to your town. (Bring cans with product in them to collection.)
 Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636.
 Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is hazardous to your health—don't remove it yourself!

Batteries, alkaline: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal to avoid fire in your trash! Batteries, automotive: Take to parts store for cash or your transfer station Fire extinguishers: Recycle empty extinguishers (NRRA takes from towns). Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes. Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex. Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling." Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector-can become a projectile if compacted in trash. Lebanon Police Station accepts some sharps. Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemeds.com for police stations taking meds. Propane or helium tanks: Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks. Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

Hydrant Flushing

Hydrant flushing will begin at the end of April and again in September. If you experience a loss of pressure it should only be temporary. Please wait 30 minutes before contacting the Town. This only impacts residents on the Town water system. This does not pertain to properties on NH Rte 4A, Lakeview Condominiums, or Shaker Village, that are only served by Town sewer.

OFFICE OF THE TAX COLLECTOR

Greetings all!

I recently sent out delinquency notices for any tax, utility, or betterment bill that was outstanding thru February 25, 2021. Thank you to each that acted upon the notice and submitted payment! For those still needing to make a payment, usually we accept payments for taxes or utilities over the counter HOWEVER, during this unprecedented time of the Covid-19 virus and social distancing, the lobby remains closed for those transactions that may be done by mail or in the night drop. The certified mailings for impending lien and impending deed notices will be mailed to those with outstanding balances due in early April.

Just as a reminder, with Federal Income tax filing time approaching, should you need the amount of property taxes you paid in 2020, it is available on the Town's website! (www.enfield.nh.us) From the home page, click on the online payments button and this will transfer to a new screen of options. Click on Tax Collector online payments and just follow the instructions from there. (Hint: when searching, use as few words as possible, such as house number and road name. Refrain from using St, Rd, Ave, Lane, etc.) Or just enter your last name and a list of possible answers will show on the right of the screen. If you need to be walked thru this process, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Dog License Renewals Due by April 30th

Dog license renewals can be conveniently paid on-line! https://www.enfield.nh.us/home/pages/online-payments

Renewals and new dog registrations can be done by mail. Simply complete the license form found online <u>HERE</u>, provide proof of the spay or neuter (for the reduced price) and proof of rabies. BUILDING, HEALTH & FIRE INSPECTION DEPARTMENTS

Building codes require all hot water heaters to have a temperature and pressure (T&P) relief valve as a critical safety feature. Enfield residents should know that the home heating industry and relief valve manufacturers recommend these devices be checked on a yearly basis to ensure proper function. At a minimum, one should take the opportunity to ask their plumbing and heating professionals to exercise the relief valve whenever they have a plumbing or heating contractor servicing their systems. Some manufacturers urge caution and recommend relief valves be replaced every 5 years, although others in the industry say they can remain in service for up to 30 years if properly checked and maintained.


T&P relief valves are designed to open automatically if the pressure in a hot water heater rises above 150 psi, or if the water temperature rises above 210 degrees Fahrenheit. This temperature is a crucial determination. Hot water turns to steam at 212 degrees, and water will increase tremendously in heat, volume, and force when converted to its gaseous state. Steam power was vital to the Industrial Revolution, and it drove large oceangoing ships, freight trains, and other powerful engines for a hundred years. It is a proven force of nature, and safety should always be a major factor in its use or avoidance.

If you have a leaking T&P relief valve, that may be a sign that it is doing what it is designed to do. The temperature and pressure in the tank may be too high, and the valve is opening to release it. The absolute worst thing a property owner or handyperson can do in this situation is remove the relief valve to stop the leak. Do not disable this critical safety feature. And never cap the discharge pipe from the relief valve to contain a leak. According to one manufacturer, an improperly disabled relief valve can potentially create enough steam pressure in the tank to cause a hot water heater to explode with the same force as a full pound of dynamite. A leaking T&P relief valve requires immediate attention, and a licensed plumber or heating contractor should be contacted to assess the cause and remedy the problem if it ever occurs.

ENERGY COMMITTEE


Here are the results of crunching eight years of electric data for four towns buildings provided by Liberty Utilities. Since the Energy Committee have been changing lights to LED reductions have been seen across the board.

- 1. Police Station, 21.7% reduction in usage
- 2. DPW 28% reduction in usage. This is still a work in progress. The Public Works building alone is saving \$3,456.35 per year.
- 3. Town Hall 35.6% reduction in usage. Most of this was the results of changing to LED in the library.
- 4. Community Center 55.6% reduction in usage. This also coincided with the ending of Bingo.

Power Purchase Agreement – Solar Array at Public Works Facility

Norwich Technologies will be increasing the solar array at the Public Works Facility to 80 kw. This is a larger array than was requested but the extra generation can be applied to the electric bill at another municipal site, for instance, the pump station on Love Joy Brook Road.

Saving Energy and Money

You may qualify for up to \$8000 in rebates for home weatherization from NHSaves. All New Hampshire electric utilities are part of NHSaves. Each utility has its own weatherization rebate program which changes each calendar year. Currently Liberty Utilities is offering rebates up to \$8000, no interest loans, and billing applied to your monthly electricity bill.

Energy audits provide information on ways to reduce your heating bills. You can request an energy audit for \$100. If you qualify for the rebate program and you proceed with getting work done, the \$100 audit fee goes toward the work.

To qualify, visit <u>https://nhsaves.com/rebates/energy-audits-weatherization/.</u> You will be asked information about the amount of conditioned living space (area usually heated) and your fuel consumption for the past year.

Households who qualify for Home Energy Assistance are urged to contact Tri County Community Action for 443-6150 for weatherization program information.

"KNOW YOUR TOWN"

"Know your Town" is presented by the Enfield Heritage Commission. Each month we'll bring you a bit of insight into the origins of street names or places you see every day.

Shaker Hill Road, from Main Street to the split with Livingstone Lodge Road

Like many things in the history of Enfield, the name of Shaker Hill Road is neither as simple nor obvious as it seems at first sight. It does climb the hill whose name reflects the fact that it was where Enfield's first Shakers congregated in the 1780s.

However, the Shakers moved from that area in the 1790s and for most of its history the artery that runs between Main Street and Shaker Hill was known as "South Street".

While the Shakers gave the hill its name, the area owes its current character to its years as the heart of Enfield's industry. It is hard to imagine now, but this stretch of the Mascoma River teemed with dams that produced power for mills that ground flour, sawed lumber, pressed cider, made bedsteads and eventually worked wool.

The first mill was built in the 1770s near the site of the Copeland Block. Several others would follow, clustered around the current intersection of Main Street and Shaker Hill Road. Bridges were built across the Mascoma, including the Shaker Hill Road one built in 1789, linking the mills to the growing road network. Although the Shakers had moved to Mascoma Lake's western shore, they owned many of the mill buildings that they leased to operators.

By the 1880s, most of the mills were involved in wool processing, including dying, spinning and weaving. The American Woolen Co. mill on Baltic Street alone employed up to 375 people in the 1950s.

The housing needed for the influx of people coming to work in these flourishing businesses, many from Finland, Ireland and Canada, gave Shaker Hill Road its current character.

Between 1892 and 1907, sixty homes and tenements were built for mill workers, most in Shaker Hill Road's side streets. Two buildings now on Wells Street were dragged across Mascoma's ice in 1890 for tenements. Most of the distinctive Mill Houses—eight duplexes—near the intersection of Shaker Hill Road and Pillsbury Street were built in 1918 by the American Wool Company for its employees, with Mill Street behind them.

Shaker Hill Road also provided homes for the mills' managers and owners. Number 27 Shaker Hill Road was the home of George Whitney, whose father purchased the Baltic Street mill complex in 1894. Soon after, Whitney set up poles and strung electric lights from Baltic Street to Shaker Hill Road and several other Enfield streets. A novelty at the time, Enfield's street lights made the town an attraction for travelers. Whitney also donated generously to the Library and Memorial building that now houses Whitney Hall, the Enfield Public Library and town offices.

In 1902, Enfield finally got a Catholic church after almost a century of celebrating Mass in homes and a meeting room above Enfield's first permanent fire station. St. Helena's Catholic Church was built on the site of a home and a lot on 36 Shaker Hill Road. The distinctive stone of its entrance was quarried from an outcropping of unusual rock near Lebanon, rolled downhill and carried across the river to be loaded onto horse carts. It is as striking today as it must have been the day it welcomed its first parishioners over a century ago.
