The Enfield Town Clerk will be open from 3:00 – 5:00 PM on September 7 *only* for the purpose of accepting absentee ballots for the September 8, 2020 State Primary.

TOWN OFFICES CLOSED DURING SEPTEMBER 8 STATE PRIMARY

The Enfield Town Offices will be closed on September 8 for regular business.

ABSENTEE BALLOT PROCEDURE FOR SEPTEMBER 8, 2020 STATE PRIMARY AND NOVEMBER 3, 2020 GENERAL ELECTION

Dear Enfield Voter,

Did you know you can request a ballot be mailed to your home, vote that ballot at home, and return your voted ballot by mail to your Town Clerk? The concern for the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) is a valid reason for voting by Absentee Ballot for the 2020 State Primary and the 2020 General Election.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we want you to know your options for requesting an Absentee Ballot. *Please help us protect the health and*

safety of our Town staff, election officials, poll workers and all voters by requesting your ballot today and returning your voted ballot by mail or hand delivering to the Town Clerk during regular office hours when the office is less busy and social distancing is possible. Please <u>do not</u> leave your <u>voted</u> Absentee Ballot in the drop box at Town Hall – your voted ballot <u>MUST</u> be handed to the Town Clerk or delivered by mail.

To request an absentee ballot:

- Go to the Town's website at <u>https://www.enfield.nh.us/town-</u> <u>clerk/pages/voter-registration-elections</u> and print the form OR call the Town Clerk's Office at 603-632-5001 OR email <u>townclerk@enfield.nh.us</u> and ask for an Application for Absentee Ballot.
- You may request an Absentee Ballot for absence (excluding absence due to residence outside the United States), religious observance, concern for the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), and disability.
- Check your party registration. You can check your party registration on the State's website here: https://app.sos.nh.gov/Public/PartyInfo.aspx Checking before requesting your ballot will avoid potential errors and delays in processing your Application for Absentee Ballot
 - For the September 8 State Primary if you are a registered Republican you must request the Republican Primary Ballot. If you are a registered Democrat you must request a Democratic Primary Ballot. If you are registered as Undeclared you may choose either a Republican or a Democratic ballot, but not both. If you are currently Undeclared and you vote in the State Primary your registered party will change to that party for which you requested a ballot. You can return to Undeclared status following the election. (Please note – You do not need to change your party for the November 3, 2020 General Election as all ballots will be the same regardless of your party registration.)
- Submit a separate Application for Absentee Ballot for each election for which you want an Absentee Ballot.
- The Town does not have Wards so leave that space on the Application for Absentee Ballot blank or enter "N/A"
- Complete the Application for Absentee Ballot in accordance with the instructions on the form and return the form to the Enfield Town Clerk by mail, delivered to the Town Offices, or left in the drop box outside the Town Offices. Applications for Absentee Ballots may be left in the drop box, but the *Ballots themselves MUST be delivered by mail or handed, in person, to the Town Clerk.*

Remember that the U.S. Post Office is closed on Labor Day, September 7. The Town Clerk will be open September 7th from 3:00 PM to 5:00 PM to accepted Absentee Ballots over the counter. No vehicle registrations will be conducted during this time. *Please submit your request as soon as possible to ensure*

there is enough time to submit the voted ballot. Voted Absentee Ballots must be received by mail no later than 5:00 PM on Tuesday, September 8th or may be hand delivered from 3:00 PM to 5:00 PM on September 7th. Hand delivered ballots cannot be accepted after 5:00 PM on September 7th.


TOWN EMPLOYEES UNDERGO ROUTINE TESTING FOR COVID-19




A WEBSITE TIP: MEETING CALENDAR & UPCOMING MEETINGS FEATURE

On our Home Page at <u>www.enfield.nh.us</u>, on the left, you'll find a Calendar of Town board and committee meetings as well as a short list of Upcoming Meetings. Depending on your monitor, you may have to scroll down just a bit. Three "Upcoming Meetings" are listed (see below for more information on this limitation). Click the meeting heading under Upcoming Meetings for more details or hover your cursor over another date to bring up a pop-up window of what's scheduled for that day, such as the Planning Board Meeting on May $27^{\rm th}$.



One of the few drawbacks to our website is that only <u>three</u> meetings will be listed under **Upcoming Meetings.** As an example, here's the February 2020 calendar. (Note the listed Upcoming Meetings are from May 2020 because that's when this Tip was created.) On February 25, 2020 only three meetings would have been listed under Upcoming Meetings but by hovering your cursor over the date you can see all four meetings for that day. In the pop-up window, simply click the committee meeting heading of interest for more details.



Another option is to click on **All upcoming events** at the end of the Upcoming Meetings list for a full-sized calendar of the entire month! This is the portion of the screen our Snip tool could capture – trust us, you be able to see the full month and all of the scheduled meetings! (You may need to scroll a bit depending on your monitor.) Click on a meeting listing in the calendar for more details.

MUNICIPAL FACILITIES EVALUATION PROJECT UPDATES

The Municipal Facilities Advisory Committee (MFAC) last met on July 27 and will be meeting again on August 10. With the conceptual designs/layouts for a renovated and expanded Whitney Hall and new public safety facility now complete, and a civil and environmental engineering firm finalizing its geotechnical evaluation for a property that is being evaluated for the possible future site of a public safety facility, the focus of the July 27 meeting was on preparing recommendations and presentation content to be delivered to the Board of Selectmen in late-August.

FIREFIGHTERS & EMERGENCY MEDICAL PERSONNEL RECRUITMENT

If you are interested in helping to protect and care for people in your community, the Town of Enfield's Fire Department and Ambulance Service welcome the opportunity to talk with you. Both departments are "call" departments and participation requirements are flexible in recognition that members will be juggling other professional or personal obligations. Members are



compensated on an hourly basis for time spent in training, responding to calls, or other related activities. Relevant training and certifications (i.e., Firefighter I or II, EMR, EMT, AEMT, Paramedic, etc.) are highly desired, but formal training can be provided to individuals who are willing to make the commitment.

Crises like the COVID-19 pandemic serve as a sobering reminder of just how critically important first responders are, and we hope that you will seriously consider how you can help.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Road Paving

The Town of Enfield reclaimed the following roads in July: Warren and Bud Mil Roads and a section of Shaker Blvd at the NH Route 4A end and a section of Livingstone Lodge Road near Wescott Road. The new road base is being provided a period of time to settle and compact prior to paving. A two-inch base of pavement will then be placed and followed by a one inch wearing course. Pavement will be applied during the month of August, with the exception of the Livingstone Lodge Road paving project which will take place in the summer of 2021.

Road Grading

The Town Highway crew will continue to grade gravel roads throughout the summer. Motorists are urged to use caution when driving through these moving work zones often with three or four working pieces of equipment.

Roadside Mowing

The Enfield Highway Department will be mowing roadsides and easement areas beginning in August. This helps keep drainage areas open for flowing water and allows for snow storage. It also improves sight distances making roads safer. Please use caution when approaching and passing the mower tractors as debris sometimes flies out from the mower heads and operator focus is on the ditch lines being mowed. Residents should mark shrubs that they do not want cut.

and programs that protect your water supply. This publication conforms to federal regulations that require water utilities to provide you this information annually. Enfield Water Department "Important Notice About Your Drinking Water"

We understand there was confusion about a recent notice sent to water customers regarding coliforms found during testing of our municipal water system. The Town was required by the State to provide notice to our water customers of this finding. What we neglected to share with our customers, and we greatly apologize for this lack of forethought, was the cause of the problem and result of the required assessment to identify and correct any problem. **We wish to assure everyone that our public drinking water is safe.** Due to COVID-19 our Water Department staff was unable to get water samples from inside one of our municipal buildings. The sample was instead taken from an outdoor spigot. The sample taken at the outdoor spigot was contaminated at the spigot. Later testing within the building came back within all allowable limits.

Enfield Water and Sewer Bills

Enfield Water and Sewer bills were mailed out the second week of July and are due August 14, 2020.

Remote Water/Sewer Meter Reading Touch Pads

The Town of Enfield has touch pads, connected to the meter with a light gauge communication wire, mounted on the side of the building. The touch pads are installed so the staff member reading individual meters does not need to enter the building in order to get a reading. It is important that these pads and wires do not get damaged. If you plan to paint your building or replace the siding, please take care to gently removed them and set them aside preferably intact. You can also contact the water/sewer department to have the pad removed temporarily while your project is completed.

Brush and Yard Waste

The Enfield Brush and Yard Waste Facility will be open during the business hours of the Transfer Station on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday. Due to COVID-19 concerns deliveries on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday or Friday will be by <u>appointment only</u>. Please call the DPW at 632-4605 to make arrangements for delivery. The facility can take clean brush and limbs up to 8" in diameter, as well as leaves and yard waste. The Town cannot take any invasive plant species, stumps or dimensional lumber. **Residents wishing to use the** *facility must have all loads checked by Town staff.* The facility cannot take commercial volumes.

Cemeteries

Cemeteries are open. Please contact the Cemetery Sexton, Bridget Labrie at 802-332-5363 (cell) or email <u>cemetery@enfield.nh.us</u> to schedule a burial or to purchase a lot. Please keep all decorations in line with the headstones to allow mowing operations to take place. 2020 Transfer Station Stickers Available

2020 Transfer Station window stickers are available, free of charge, at the Enfield Transfer Station & Recycling Center or Enfield Town Offices. Proof of residency or property ownership is required. An Enfield vehicle permit sticker must be affixed to the window of your car or truck on the side window behind the front passenger's seat, or with regular cab pick-ups in the lower corner of the rear window behind the passenger.

Enfield Transfer Station stickers also permit you to use the Town beach parking lot on Mascoma Lake (on Route 4A opposite the beach and boat launch) and access to the driveway sand located at the DPW.

Enfield Transfer Station Punch Cards

In an effort to make the Transfer Station more efficient and also respond to deficiencies noted by the New Hampshire Department of Labor the Town of Enfield has implemented a punch card system that will take the place of all transactions by cash or check. Residents can purchase punch cards at the Town Office to be used to pay fees at the Transfer Station. Cards have a face value of \$25.00 and attendants have a hole punch tool that is used to punch the cards for the corresponding amount of the item being disposed of. Each card is broken up into five \$5.00 sections and all of the fee items listed below are also in \$5.00 increments. The Transfer Station attendants accepted cash through the month of October 2019, but this practice was discontinued in November 2019. Checks will continue to be accepted for a period of time to give residents time to get to the Town Office to purchase the punch cards.

Please Use Curbside Trash and Recycling Services

In light of the current pandemic, the Town encourages the use of the curbside trash and recycling services. By doing this it reduces contact with Town staff and others at the Transfer Station and handling of bag and receptacle surfaces is reduced. If it is necessary to use the Transfer Station please unload as quickly as possible and exit. If possible, keep fee recycling items at home until the pandemic is over to limit the face to face contact needed to complete a transaction for a fee charged recycling item.

Trash and Zero Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station costs the Town of Enfield significantly more per ton than trash and recycling collected curbside due to extra hauling charges. Trash collected at the Transfer Station costs approximately \$30 per ton more than material collected curbside (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included). Zero-Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station costs the Town over \$80 per ton more than recycling collected at curbside due to the extra hauling fees (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included).

Please do your part to <u>help keep our solid waste expenses down and reduce</u> possible exposure to COVID-19 in the process)!

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day (Updated Flyer PDF)

The next collections are scheduled for Saturday, August 8 at the Newbury Town Garage and Saturday, October 3 at the Lebanon High School. See the flyer below for other dates and items accepted. There will be some new rules for drop off due to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- Put waste in trunk or truck bed
- Stay in vehicle; do NOT get out for any reason
- Only people from participating towns; we will not be collecting money at the collection from anyone
- No waste containers returned
- Wear mask when near people with window on vehicle down
- The survey will be "what town are you from?" only; nothing will be handed out

Alkaline batteries: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal. Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636. Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is

hazardous to your health-don't even think about removing it yourself! Automotive batteries: Take to parts store for cash back or your transfer station Empty aerosol cans: Can be recycled with scrap metal. Talk to your town. Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes. Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex. Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemeds.com for police stations taking meds. Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling." Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector—can become a projectile if compacted in trash. Lebanon Police Station accepts some sharps. Propane or helium tanks and fire extinguishers: Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks. Empty fire extinguishers can be recycled (NRRA takes from towns). Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is hard to believe that August is here already. It will not be long before we are talking about snow.

The summer months have been a busy time for the members of the Enfield Police Department. We would like to remind those using the beach and boat launch that the lower parking area is for <u>vehicles with boat trailers</u> and the upper lot is for the beach users or vehicles without boat trailers (i.e., canoes, kayaks, and other nonmotorized watercraft that do not require a trailer). We also have a non-motorized boat launch and parking at the Mascoma Lakeside Park at the other end of the Shaker Bridge. There have been several instances where the boat launch has been blocked by traffic or people loitering around the dock. Please be responsible and launch your boat and move on so others can use the launch and dock as well. Those that use the lakes often probably have seen NH Fish and Game and Marine Patrol on the lakes. The Police Department has teamed up with the other departments in order to track and apprehend impaired boaters and those driving dangerously out on the water. If you see unsafe issues while out on the lakes, please contact the Police Department at 603-643-2222 or Marine Patrol at 603-293-2037.

The Enfield Police Department would also like to take this opportunity to remind residence of the Class B and Class C fireworks ordinances. The ordinances can be found at

In August, the Police Department will be holding several patrols specific to detecting impaired drivers and distracted drivers. Both impaired and distracted drivers are still the leading cause of serious motor vehicle crashes in Enfield. If you see a possible impaired driver please contact the Enfield Police Department by calling 603-643-2222.

Lastly, but certainly not least, our beloved Paula Rowe has decided that after more than 30 years of service to our community that she is going to retire in the coming months. Paula has been a fixture at the Police Station for many years, and she is going to be very missed by her coworkers and the public she has served.

With Paula's retirement on the horizon, the Town Manager, Police Chief, Fire Chief, and Ambulance Chief reviewed existing staff needs and reached the conclusion that it would be beneficial to restructure this position to that of a "Public Safety Administrative Coordinator" that supported all three public safety departments. The Town has already published the job announcement, and applications will be accepted for the Public Safety Administrator Coordinator position until August 18th. Please refer to each town's individual website for updated information on park and beach openings. We respectfully ask that you follow the guidelines and rules established at each park and beach to help keep everyone safe!


If you decide to head out to a public park or go for walk/bike/run on a public

trail, please follow the recommendations from the National Recreation & Parks Association to help keep you safe on our public trails and in our public parks.



Recommendations for trail users on observing social distancing minimums:

- Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to heading to trails — wash hands, carry hand sanitizer, do not use trails if you have symptoms, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, etc.
- Observe at all times CDC's minimum recommended social distancing of six feet from other people. Practice it and know what it looks like. Keep it as you walk, bike or hike.
- Warn other trail users of your presence and as you pass to allow proper distance and step off trails to allow others to pass, keeping minimum recommended distances at all times. Signal your presence with your voice, bell or horn.
- Note that trail and park users may find public restrooms closed be prepared before you leave and time outings so that you are not dependent on public restrooms.
- Bring water or drinks public drinking fountains may be disabled and should not be used, even if operable.
- Bring a suitable trash bag. Leave no trash, take everything out to protect park workers

FIRE DEPARTMENT

We hope you are enjoying summer as much as you are able to under the circumstances. It seems that even with the pandemic still going on, summer is flying by.

Even though Town Meeting took place little more than a few weeks ago, preparations are being made for the 2021 budget and our capital plan. As part of that, we will soon be doing the specifications and preparing the presentation for proposed replacement for Engine 4 and the Rescue truck, combining them into one truck. This will be a detailed process, and there will be a competitive bid process with multiple manufacturers. Stay tuned for more information in the next couple months.

After many days and hours, and a significant delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we would like to congratulate Mark Olsen for successfully

completing his Firefighter 1/2 class. He is now a certified firefighter. He is also one of the top responders in the department. We would like to not only congratulate him for completing and passing the class, but also thank him for his positive attitude and commitment to the Town.

Responses to calls continue to climb. The Enfield Fire Department responded to 139 calls for all of 2019 and we have already responded to 125 calls thus far in 2020. With several months left in the year, it certainly appears we are going to end up responding to a much higher call volume. If the trend continues, this could be one of our busiest years ever.

LAND USE & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OFFICE

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) held 2 hearings is July, both for the granting of "special exceptions" in the Community Business (CB) district. The first hearing was to allow for the conversion of a multi-use property at 411 US Route 4 into "multi-family" housing as prescribed in the CB section of the special exception chapter of the Enfield Zoning Ordinance. This application was approved, clearing the way for a follow-up Planning Board major site plan review (SPR) application discussed below. The second application/ hearing was for a home-based daycare center at 266 US Route 4 (across from the Enfield Village School). The ZBA also approved this application which made another follow-up SPR at the Planning Board possible (see below).

The Planning Board held hearings in July and approved three applications for a variety of land use matters and continued another until August 12th. The first hearing was for a conversion of a multi-use property at 411 US Route 4. This site was previously the location of Lapan Insurance and Doctors Who Care as well as an earlier gun shop use. The applicant, Oakes and Son of Lebanon, is looking to convert the entire property into rental housing. He has plans for up to seven units (5 in the main structure and 2 in the garage). It was noted during the hearing that there is very strong demand in the rental housing market. The second hearing was concerning a home-based daycare center proposed at 266 US Route 4 (across from the Enfield Village School). The applicant also pointed out the extreme shortage of available slots in the childcare industry in the Upper Valley. Minor SPR was approved at this location after a productive discussion with the applicants. The third hearing was relative to boundary line adjustments (BLA) and voluntary lot mergers (VLM) at the end of Lake Street on Lake Mascoma. The applicant in this land use case wanted to make lots more conforming and to "clean up" some odd shaped lots for future family ownership. This project received approvals thanks to the expert and diligent work of the local surveyor who represented for the

applicant. The final hearing was for a proposed carwash at 572 US Route 4. This hearing was continued until August 12th to allow for more professional engineering documentation to be produced.

New Economic Development Incentives (RSA 72:81) - The Town has implemented a new economic development program known as the "Commercial and Industrial Construction Exemption" (RSA 72:81). This is a new construction property tax exemption for commercial and industrial uses (as defined in RSA 72:80). The intent of the exemption is to provide incentives to businesses to build, modernize, or enlarge within the Town. The details are as follows: the exemption shall apply only to municipal and local school property taxes assessed by the Town. State education and county taxes are excluded from the exemption. The exemption shall be granted for a maximum of fifty percent (50%) of the increase in assessed value attributable to the improvements, and shall remain in effect for a maximum period of ten (10) years. As adopted by Town Meeting on July 11th, the exemption shall apply to all properties within the municipality for which a proper application is filed. The percentage rate and duration of the exemption shall be granted on a case by case basis related to the amount and value of public benefit provided, as determined by the Enfield Selectboard. In order to satisfy the "public benefit requirement" of this program, a minimum of one of the following must be provided: a) enhance economic growth and increase the Town's tax base; b) creation of needed services or facilities not currently available in the Town; c) redevelop and revitalize commercial or industrial area; d) prevent or eliminate blight; or, e) retain local jobs, increase local job base, and/or provide diversity in the job base. As approved, this exemption program shall remain in effect for a maximum of five (5) tax years.

Both Land Use Boards have hearings scheduled for August. The Zoning Board will meet on 8/11/2020 at 7:00 pm to hear an application for a variance at 360 Crystal Lake Road and the Planning Board will meet on 8/12/2020 at 7:00 pm to hear the continuation of the carwash application referenced above. Another meeting of the Planning Board is tentatively scheduled for 8/26/2020, if any timely applications are received for hearings.

Due to COVID19 protocols, our office is closed for walk in visitors, however with the proper personal protective equipment (read: masks), appointments can be made for in person meetings or site visits. ENFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY

As we head into August, it seems unbelievable that we haven't had anyone other than staff in the library in five months. As other libraries slowly begin to open, either by appointment or with very limited hours, I am paying close attention to the measures they are taking to keep everyone healthy and feeling safe.

Due to the size and layout issues we are facing, I believe an appointment system is going to work the best as it will allow us to limit the number of people and the length of time they are inside. What needs to happen before we can offer appointments:

-Plexiglas barriers installed at the circulation desk

-Re-configure the circulation desk so that patrons can scan their own items -Plan for better ventilation (summer) and possibly purification (when the weather starts to cool)

Please know that we are working hard on solving these issues. Until then, we are still offering curbside pick up Monday-Friday and so far we have put out 190 bags! We are happy to take requests over the phone and through email. The State interlibrary loan system is still not running, however.

The building may be closed, but (most) library services are still available to you. Please do not hesitate to ask how we can help!

We in the Town Clerk's Office are doing our best to meet your needs in the face of COVID-19. We are open again and available during our customary hours of operation on Monday through Friday. We have instituted a number of procedures to help minimize people's exposure to one another. We are still strongly encouraging residents to take full advantage of the ability to complete many common transactions online. OFFICE OF THE TAX COLLECTOR

Greetings all! THANK YOU to all who have taken advantage of paying their bills online, by mail or in the night drop located just to the left of the entry door to Town Hall. For your safety and ours, we appreciate continued use of these three options. If you have a transaction that cannot be done by either mail, online or dropping in the night drop, the lobby is open again; a mask is required and no more than two persons in the lobby at one time.

As a reminder, the first issue tax bills were due on July 1st and the 1st issue sewer betterment bills were due on June 24th. Now that that those are behind us, it is time to kick-back and enjoy all that Enfield has to offer - albeit in a safe, social distancing kind of way. If you missed either of the billing due dates, no worries - you do not have to miss a moment of sunshine as you can still make your payment online at www.enfield.nh.us. The betterment assessment billings, water and sewer billings, gravel, timber and land use change taxes may also be paid online. It is also important to remember that paperless billing is available as new bills are issued! Payments made by electronic check online have an additional flat fee of \$0.95. Payments by credit card have an additional fee of 2.95%. To make a payment online, from the home page, click on the online payments button and this will transfer to a new screen of options. Click on Tax Collector online payments and just follow the instructions from there. (Hint: when searching, use as few words as possible, such as house number and road name. Refrain from using St, Rd, Ave, Lane, etc.) Or just enter your last name and a list of possible answers will show on the right of the screen.

This is a reminder that once your Building Permit has been approved, the copy of the Building Permit you receive is to be posted on the property in a location visible from the road. This is required by code and will save time when abutting property owners have questions due to the work being undertaken. Also, on property located within the Shoreline Protection Area, the state permit does need to be in place before we can issue a permit or any work can begin.

MASCOMA LAKESIDE PARK – PAVILION CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

Members of the Mascoma Lakeside Committee would like to extend their appreciation to local architect Paul Mirski, who has been graciously providing

pro bono design services and consultation in support of the Town's efforts to construct an open air pavilion at Mascoma Lakeside Park (reminder: the pavilion is being funded exclusively from a combination of private donations and a \$135,000 matching grant from the Northern Border Regional Commission). The committee will continue working closely with Mr. Mirski and others to ensure that the park is ultimately designed and developed in a manner that is consistent with the needs and values of our residents and visitors.

After careful review of the proposals submitted by multiple area contractors, it was determined that the construction contract would be awarded to Upper Valley Building and Remodeling (owned and operated by Sean Lacey). The Town's Building Inspector will serve as the Owner's Rep on the project). The goal is to have the pavilion fully constructed and the project finalized by November 2020. Site work and construction will begin in August 2020.

Although the committee has officially raised the additional \$135,000 in private funds needed to match (dollar for a dollar) a \$135,000 matching grant from the Northern Borders Regional Commission to help fund improvements to the park property (which is a major achievement), private fundraising efforts are still needed to ensure that we have



the financing required to complete all the planned improvements.

TOWN OFFICES RE-OPENED TO THE PUBLIC – JUNE 15

Enfield Town Offices have been reopened to the public (effective June 15), with the following modified procedures in place:

- Town Hall was thoroughly cleaned prior to reopening, and will continue to be thoroughly cleaned every evening.
- Hand sanitizer stations have been established throughout the building, and members of the public are asked to use such hand sanitizer prior to entering any Department.
- Plexiglass guards have been installed at the Town Clerk & Tax Collector customer service counters.
- Prior to reporting back to work, employees will let supervisors know if they need a cloth mask, and cloth masks will be provided to employees that need them.
- When possible, workstations will be separated by at least six feet. Wherever needed, 6' demarcations will be added to areas where people often wait for service.
- To the extent possible, we will maintain only one public entrance to Town Hall (via the rear parking lot), where masks and hand sanitizer will be available to the public.
- The back stairwell will be used as an exit to allow for one-way foot traffic.
- Access to the Offices beyond the lobby will be by appointment only.
- All visitors to Town Hall must wear masks. Signage for the public entrance has been posted which includes the following information:

ATTENTION ALL VISITORS:

For your health and the health of others, we require that you *use HAND SANITIZER AND WEAR A CLOTH FACE COVERING OR DISPOSABLE MASK - COVERING BOTH YOUR MOUTH AND NOSE* while in the building. If you do not have a face covering, a mask will be provided to you. Visitors without face coverings will not receive service from Town employees. We want all Town employees and visitors to feel as safe as possible.

Occupancy is LIMITED so wait times may be longer than usual.

ONE WAY traffic – follow arrows.

Only **ONE** person in the vestibule at a time. Please wait until vestibule is empty before entering.

Only **TWO** individuals in the lobby at a time. Please wait until there is one or fewer individuals in the lobby before entering.

Please maintain 6' social distancing at all times.


HISTORIC ENFIELD VILLAGE – MAIN STREET WALKING TOUR

HIGH-SPEED/FIBER OPTIC CABLE INTERNET ACCESS

In recent weeks, an ad hoc committee comprised of local residents with interest and expertise in the telecommunications industry has been formed to identify and advance ways in which access to high-speed internet can be improved in the Town of Enfield. The Land Use & Community Development Administrator is serving as the staff lead on this effort. Although the NH FastRoads initiative



resulted in a major build-out of "middle mile" fiber optic cable throughout a majority of public roads in Enfield several years ago, the current owner of the fiber optic infrastructure (FirstLight) has signaled a lack of interest or willingness to connect new residential customers. Improving residential access to high-speed internet is essential for the Town of Enfield as it will help us attract and retain residents. The working group is exploring a variety of possible solutions, some of which may involve state or federal legislative active.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Water Saving Tips to Help You Save Money on Your Next Water/Sewer Bill

- *Check faucets and pipes for leaks.* A small drip from a worn faucet washer can waste 20 gallons of water per day. Larger leaks can waste hundreds of gallons.
- *Check your toilets for leaks.* Put a little food coloring in your toilet tank. If, without flushing, the color begins to appear in the bowl within 30 minutes, you have a leak that should be repaired immediately. Most replacement parts are inexpensive and easy to install.
- Use your water meter to check for hidden water leaks. Read the house water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is

being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, there is a leak.

- Install water-saving shower heads and low-flow faucet aerators. Inexpensive water-saving low-flow shower heads or restrictors are easy for the homeowner to install. Long, hot showers can use five to ten gallons every unneeded minute. "Low-flow" means it uses less than 2.5 gallons per minute (gpm). Also, all household faucets should be fit with low-flow aerators. 2.5 gpm may be needed in a kitchen sink but bathroom faucets and other water outlets should be 1.5 gpm or lower. Check gpm rating on packaging to be sure the advertised "lowflow" is at or below these levels. This single best home water conservation method is also the least expensive!
- *Insulate your water pipes.* It's easy and inexpensive to insulate your water pipes with pre-slit foam pipe insulation. You'll get hot water faster plus avoid wasting water while it heats up.
- *Take shorter showers.* One way to cut down on water use is to turn off the shower after soaping up, then turn it back on to rinse. A fourminute shower uses approximately 20 to 40 gallons of water. Limit your showers to the time it takes to soap up, wash down and rinse off.
- *Turn off the water after you wet your toothbrush.* There is no need to keep the water running while brushing your teeth. Just wet your brush and fill a glass for mouth rinsing.
- *Rinse your razor in the sink.* Fill the sink with a few inches of warm water. This will rinse your razor just as well as running water, with far less waste of water.
- Use your dishwasher and clothes washer for only full loads. Automatic dishwashers and clothes washers should be fully loaded for optimum water conservation. Most makers of dishwashing soap recommend not pre-rinsing dishes which is a big water savings. With clothes washers, avoid the permanent press cycle, which uses an added 20 liters (5 gallons) for the extra rinse. For partial loads, adjust water levels to match the size of the load. Replace old clothes washers. New Energy Star rated washers use 35 50% less water and 50% less energy per load. If you're in the market for a new clothes washer, consider buying a water-saving frontload washer.
- *Keep a bottle of drinking water in the fridge.* Running tap water to cool it off for drinking water is wasteful. Store drinking water in the fridge in a safe drinking bottle.

How to Improve Recycling

Meetings of the Planning Board are on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. The Zoning Board of Adjustment is a quasi-judicial body that has the responsibility for special exceptions and variances of the Town Zoning Ordinance. We have openings for **Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) alternates**. Meetings of the ZBA are the second Tuesday of each month (as needed).
