TAX COLLECTOR'S OFFICE

Greetings all! Things are really happening in the Tax Office. The water/sewer bills were due November 22nd, the Sewer Betterment bills are due December 8th and second issue 2021 property tax bills are due December 29th. We really appreciate all those who have already made their payments. THANK YOU!

The online bill-pay and the paperless billing options seem to be functioning well. For making any of these payments, utilizing the Paperless billing and the online bill payment options are strongly encouraged!

Some benefits of paperless billings are:

• Environmental – no actual paper bill and thus no envelop necessary. No transportation required by any vehicle using gas, diesel or battery and saves wear and tear of our roads!

- No need to remember the due date. Three Reminders are emailed! First email sent when bills are ready to pay (no need to watch for the postal carrier!), second email sent 10 days prior to the due date and the third email sent the day prior to the due date.
- If paid online, an immediate email receipt of the transaction is sent so no worries about having to remember whether or not you actually made the payment or searching for a paper receipt. Payments made by electronic check on line have an additional flat fee of 95 cents. Payments by credit card have an additional fee of 2.95%.

**You may print the bill and bring it in to the office with your payment if you prefer.

- It's so easy to sign up for paperless billing by going to www.enfield.nh.us, online payments, enter your last name under owner and click the search button. Your name should appear on the right side of the screen. Choose you, add an invoice to cart and click on "check out". The very next screen will have a box to toggle stating "Yes, I am the Primary Owner for the parcel(s) I have selected and I want to sign up for Paperless Bill Notification." You will also need to enter your email address here.
- Cost savings-Paperless billing also helps to keep Town spending down by reducing printing, postage and production costs associated with mailing out the paper invoices.

Of course, even without signing up for paperless billing, you may view and or pay your invoices on line 24/7 at www.enfield.nh.us.

LAND USE AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Enfield Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) did not meet in November, as there were no applications for appeals received. They do have a Variance hearing scheduled for the 14th of December. This will be for Land Use Case # Z21-12-01 where BMB Real Estate will request a variance to Enfield's Zoning Ordinance (Article IV, Section 401.1) to allow for a self-storage business to be constructed and operated in the "R1" Residential Zoning District. The subject property is located at 223 US Route 4 (Tax Map 33, Lot 5) and is currently owned by Walter Brown III and Janine Brown. This parcel is partially within both the "CB" District and the "R1" District. The Planning Board met on November 10th to conduct a hearing for a minor subdivision application. This was Enfield Land Use Case # P21-11-01 where Mark Kenney sought minor subdivision approval to create two lots from one on Oak Hill Road (map 12, lot 21-1). The subject property is in the "R5" zoning district and is currently 11.4 acres total. Lot "A" will become 6.42 acres and lot "B" will become 5.03 acres. Mark E. Kenney is the property owner, and he was represented by Chris Rollins, LLS. The Planning Board granted their approval for this application. Another item on the PB's agenda was the proposed Zoning Ordinance changes/amendments. These will also be discussed at the next PB meeting on December 8th. The Master Planning Task Force held a three Visioning Sessions over the weekend of November 5th and 6th. Two sessions were held at the Enfield Community Building in person on Saturday and a virtual session was held via Zoom on Sunday. Please complete the survey before December 6th. It is best if you take it online, however paper copies are available at the Town Offices, the Library and the DPW Facility. Completed paper copies can be left in drop boxes at these same locations The Task Force is continuing to work with Brandy Saxton of PlaceSense of Hartland, VT. Brandy has developed an outline of the Master Plan and worked up a timeline for completion. The twice a month (on the second and fourth Mondays) Master Planning Task Force Meetings continue to be very productive and collaborative with professional and volunteer contributions alike.

BUILDING INSPECTOR/HEALTH OFFICER

The following information was provided by NH Department of Environmental Services:

Burning Dry Firewood Saves Money and Improves Air Quality

There are those wood stove owners who succumb to the colder temperatures of fall by burning wood right away, and then there are those who wear it like a badge of honor if they can go late into the season before starting that first fire – perhaps believing they can hold winter at bay just a little longer. Regardless of which camp of wood stove owner you fall in, it is time to make sure you have enough dry firewood or wood pellets ready to go for this winter.

Evaluating the moisture content of cord firewood can be tricky. Wood can be purchased when it is "green," "seasoned," "dried," or "kiln dried," but these are relative terms and wood is only ready to be burned when its moisture content is 20% or less. Wet wood is a waste. Burning wet wood produces less heat because energy goes into boiling off residual water so that the wood can ignite. Not only that, but the process releases pollution into the air and creosote in your chimney, which can lead to a fire hazard. Burning dry wood produces more heat, saves you money and improves air quality.

When talking with firewood suppliers, always be sure to ask how they define the terms they are using to describe their products. Here are a couple of general guidelines to keep in mind when talking to a firewood supplier:

- Green wood is fresh cut and should not be used for fuel until it has had time to dry
 properly. This is the least expensive to purchase and will require 6-12 months to dry
 properly depending on species and conditions.
- Dry wood refers to air-dried wood that should be an immediately burnable product at the time of delivery. Dry wood should never be stored uncovered as it will reabsorb rain and snow.
- Kiln dried wood has been dried through the introduction of heat in a deliberately controlled environment a process that drastically shortens the drying time. As with dry wood, kiln dried firewood should be an immediately burnable product at time of delivery. This has the highest cost to purchase, but is of a very high quality that many people prefer. Because it takes energy to dry the wood, it is slightly less climate-friendly than air-dried wood!
- Seasoned wood is the least well defined of any of the terms associated with firewood.
 "Seasoning" is synonymous with "drying" but the key to the wood's actual moisture content is how long and under what conditions the wood has been "seasoned." When purchasing "seasoned" wood, always be sure to ask your dealer how long the wood has

been split, as opposed to just felled, and if it was stacked under cover to facilitate drying. You should assume that seasoned wood is not ready to burn without further drying.

If you are not planning to buy dry wood, the best strategy is to plan at least 6-12 months ahead and allow plenty of time for your wood to dry under cover and with ample airflow around it. Order wood during the winter or early spring for the following year, then stack and cover it to dry during the spring and summer for burning the following fall. This is the most reliable and economical way to ensure your supply of properly dried firewood.

If you are interested in burning less wood altogether, consider replacing your old wood-burning stove with a newer, cleaner burning model. New stoves burn less wood to produce the same amount of heat. Wood pellet stoves are also very efficient, typically needing just about 40 pounds of pellets per day during a winter day. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Winter Ban

The Enfield Board of Selectmen wishes to remind citizens of Enfield that the Winter Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 through April 1.

No vehicle shall at any time be parked on any public or publicly maintained street, alley, roadway, parking lot or way open to the public, in a manner that hinders in any fashion the maintenance of the way.

Driveway Snow Placement

A reminder that it is unlawful to plow snow across all Town and State roads or to deposit snow within the traveled portion of a public street pursuant to RSA 236:20, Paragraph VII, and RSA 41:11. Property owners are responsible for their plowing contractors. The Enfield Police Department will enforce this law.

2022 Transfer Station Stickers Available

The 2022 Transfer Station window stickers are available at the Town Office and the Transfer Station. An Enfield vehicle permit sticker must be affixed to the window of your car or truck on the side window behind the front passenger's seat, or with regular cab pick-ups in the lower corner of the rear window behind the passenger. Permit stickers are available, free of charge, at the Enfield Transfer Station & Recycling Center or Enfield Town Offices. Proof of residency or property ownership is required.

Enfield permit stickers also permit you to use the town beach parking lot on Mascoma Lake and access to the driveway sand located at the DPW.

DPW Staff will be enforcing the sticker requirement at the Transfer Station and the citizen sand pile beginning in early January. <u>In the era of the pandemic please plan ahead and obtain your sticker before you need it</u>.

Water/Sewer Bills

Fourth quarter water and sewer bills will be mailed out in early January. Meter reading will be conducted at the end of December.

Driveway Sand

Driveway sand is available at the DPW during their business hours (Monday-Friday from 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM) and is located at the top of the driveway in the bin on the right. It is open to Enfield residents with a current Transfer Station Stickers. It is not intended for commercial applicators or to be taken in commercial volumes. Salt, ledge sand and materials in the shed are **NOT** available.

Here is the information for <u>Overdrive</u>. The New Hampshire Downloadable Books Consortium was established to help New Hampshire public libraries provide digital materials to their patrons. The digital collection is comprised of fiction and nonfiction eBooks and audiobooks, which aims to mirror the popular physical collections found in NH public libraries. Digital

materials are selected with consideration of patron demand, popularity, availability, and cost of the materials. Consortium members select titles to submit to the coordinator of the Consortium for purchase.

"KNOW YOUR TOWN"

"Know your Town" is presented by the Enfield Heritage Commission. Each month we'll bring you a bit of insight into the origins of street names or places you see every day.

An Old American Tradition

Property disputes and government officials feathering their nests have been American traditions since Europeans first arrived on New England's shores. The early New Hampshire governor Benning Wentworth was good at both. In 1741, Wentworth was appointed governor of what was known as the Province of New Hampshire by British king George III. Part of Wentworth's role was to create townships and distribute land "...in equal shares...unto our loving subjects".

Wentworth interpreted his mandate broadly. He handed out land on the west side of the Connecticut River, which was actually claimed by the Province of New York. This tangle was fully resolved only when the area, now called Vermont, became a U.S. state in 1791.

What would affect Enfield more directly, however, was Wentworth's personal greed. Instead of granting land as he was supposed to, Wentworth outright sold it or made gifts in return for personal favors. He also helped himself to five hundred acres of land from each transaction—and took a fee on top!

Many who bought into or benefited from Wentworth's New Hampshire schemes (referred to as the "proprietors") were from Connecticut. One group of speculators were soldiers who found they liked the Enfield area while passing through after the French and Indian War on their way back to their homes in Enfield, Connecticut. When they petitioned the governor for a charter, Wentworth granted it. He also took five hundred acres of land near Methodist Hill in the new Enfield for himself. The land that Wentworth distributed came with the condition that it be cleared and cultivated. Failure to do so within five years would result in the land's return to the governor. Many landholders were unable to meet the conditions for improvement or cultivation and their land returned to the New Hampshire government.

Benning Wentworth was eventually removed from his position as governor. He was replaced by his nephew, who then set up a new charter. Under this new charter Enfield was renamed Relham (for a grantee who was a well-known New Hampshire physician) and the land was handed out again.

Not surprisingly, the beneficiaries of the original Enfield charter were not happy and fought to reclaim their ownership. It took eleven years to settle this ensuing "War of the Charters". Finally in 1779 the dispute was resolved; the Relham charter was closed and the original Enfield one was restored. This time, the land was given out for free. With the cloud of litigation finally lifted, Enfield could attract settlers and grow.

As part of the dispute resolution, the land involved was surveyed properly. Enfield got the borders it still has today, well almost. That strange jog in the town line on Enfield's southeast border with Grafton dates to 1837 when two Grafton residents petitioned Enfield to incorporate their land because they found it easier to business and go to religious meetings in Enfield.
