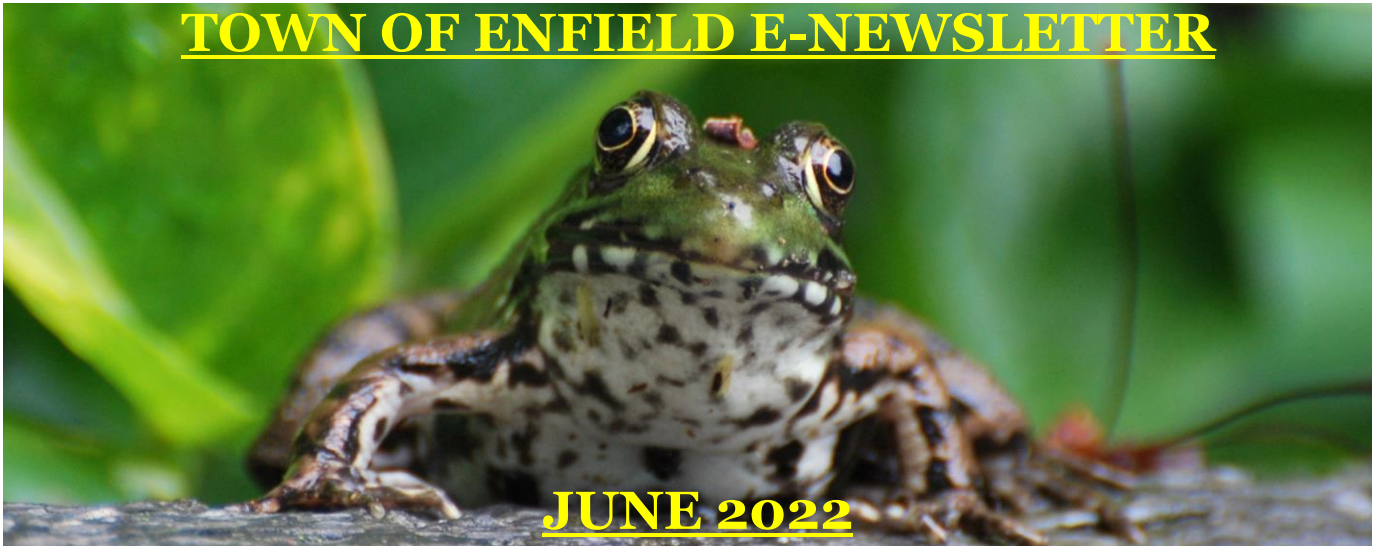

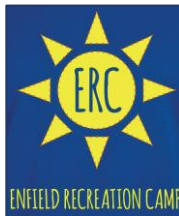
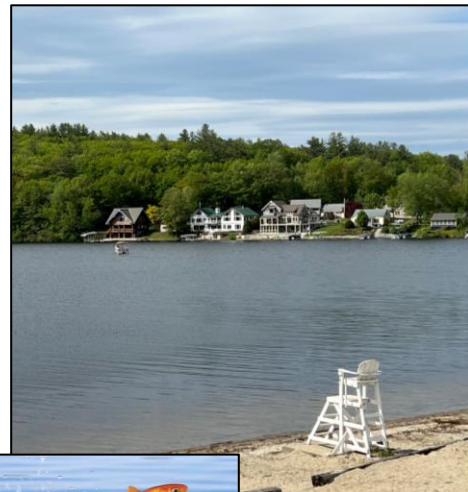

TOWN CLERK / TAX COLLECTOR'S OFFICE

Summer has arrived and the volume of registrations of recreational vehicles and boats are keeping us very busy! Please keep this in mind if you plan to register your vehicles now as lines are a bit longer.

As a reminder, for both Tax and Clerk Offices, some transactions may be done online through the Town's website www.enfield.nh.us. Payments for taxes or utilities over the counter may be made by cash or check only. The Town Clerk's office can accept credit cards over the counter for registrations and vitals only.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Enfield Brush Facility Closure – Brush & Yard Waste Disposal

Due to an unfortunate breakdown of the Town's chipper caused by metal hidden in brush brought to the Transfer Station last weekend the Town cannot accept brush at either location until further notice. Leaf and garden waste can still be brought to both DPW and the Transfer Station. Loads are required to be checked by Town Staff. Brush and limbs can be brought to the Lebanon Landfill or to Hammond's on US Route 4 just outside of Canaan Village. Fees may apply. The Town cannot take any invasive plant species. **Residents wishing to use the facility must have all loads checked by Town staff.** The facility does not take commercial volumes.

Ditching Material Request

As we enter the summer maintenance season the Highway Department would like to establish sites to dump material that is removed from our roadside ditches. These sites need to be pre-approved through a site visit, signed waiver of liability, and approval from the Highway Department. If you would like to request being added to our list or have any questions, please call the Highway Department @ (603) 442-5418.

Water/Sewer Billing

The Town of Enfield Water/Sewer Department will be reading meters at the end of June. Bills will be out in early July and will be due in the middle of August 2021. Poll credit forms are available on the Town Website and are due June 29, 2022 for credit on second quarter bills.

Road Grading

The Town Highway crew will be grading of gravel roads throughout the summer. Motorists are urged to use caution when driving through these moving work zones often with three or four working pieces of equipment.

Aerosol cans, empty: Recycle with scrap metal. Talk to your town. (Bring cans with product in them to collection.)

Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636.

Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is hazardous to your health—don't remove it yourself!

Batteries, alkaline: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal to avoid fire in your trash!

Batteries, automotive: Take to parts store for cash or your transfer station

Fire extinguishers: Recycle empty extinguishers (NRRRA takes from towns).

Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes.

Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex.

Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling." Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector—can become a projectile if compacted in trash. *Lebanon Police Station accepts some sharps.*

Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemeds.com for police stations taking meds.

Propane or helium tanks: Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks.

Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Summer is here and so is the warm weather; with that warm weather people are out enjoying the many sights and areas that Enfield has to offer. The department would like to remind everyone to be safe and share the road. The department has made a pamphlet that reminds us of the rules of the road for bikers, pedestrians, horse riders and motorists. You can find one of these at the town offices, the police station and several other locations around town, like Jakes Market.

With the warmer months we frequently have issues with parking regarding the beach and boat launch. The lower parking lot is for boat launch (vehicle with trailer) parking only. The upper beach parking lot is for beach goers. There is no parking of vehicles with trailers in the upper lot. There is also no parking between the NO PARKING signs along Route 4-A. Please be considerate of others using the parking lots and park responsibly to allow as many vehicles as we can.

Recently we have received several complaints of speeding on roads such as Crystal Lake Road and May Street. The police department will have several directed patrols this month to address the issue of speed on our residential roads. The department has also been using the speed trailer to advise residents of speed in specific areas. This trailer is a great tool that allows the department to collect data as it records the number of vehicles and the speed of each vehicle that passes it. LAND USE AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Enfield Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) met on May 10th for four scheduled hearings. But first on the agenda, was the reorganization of the board following Town Meeting. Mike Diehn was elected board chair and Susan Brown was elected vice chair. Three alternates were appointed to assist with a board vacancy and also when elected members are unable to attend a meeting. These new alternate members include Tim Lenihan, Ed McLaughlin and Celie Aufiero. These three were sworn in immediately by Town Clerk Wendy Huntley.

Then it was on to the first scheduled hearing which had been continued from the April ZBA meeting. This was Land Use Case # Z22-03-02 where Peter and Teri Tabur were seeking a special exception to Enfield's Zoning Ordinance, as provided in Article 406.1 (Section D), to construct a driveway that crosses wetlands areas. Owned by Peter and Teri Tabur, the subject property's address is 84 George Hill Road (Tax Map 9A, Lot 6) and is 130.5 acres in size. It is located in the Rural Residential-Agricultural (R5) zoning district. Pathways Consulting LLC of Lebanon is representing the Taburs in this matter. The applicant in this case again asked for and was granted a third continuation. It will now be heard at the June ZBA meeting instead.

Next up was Land Use Case # Z22-05-01, where Miles Clark, Elissa Crosby and Brandon Crosby were seeking variance relief from the Enfield Zoning Ordinance Article IV, section 401.4(P) to construct a single-family home within the prescribed setbacks to the street and side lot

boundaries. The subject parcel is 0.10 acres and is located on Flanders Street (Tax Map 33, Lot 29) in the “Community Business District or “CB” zoning district and is owned by Miles Clark and Elissa Crosby. After hearing from the applicant and members of the public, including an abutter, this variance was denied due to the board’s concern over the limited setbacks the applicant was able to achieve in their application.

Then it was on to Land Use Case # Z22-05-02, Nicole Sipe was seeking variance relief from Enfield’s Zoning Ordinance Article IV, section 401.3(T) to occupy a camper trailer or recreational vehicle for longer than 6 months in a calendar year. The subject parcel is 90.7 acres and is located at 672 Bog Road (Tax Map 1, Lot 3) in the Rural Residential-Agricultural District or “R5” zoning district and is owned by Nicole Sipe. After hearing from the applicant and no members of the public or abutters, this variance was granted.

Last on the docket was Land Use Case # Z22-05-03, where Brad and Donna Rich were seeking variance relief from the Enfield Zoning Ordinance Article IV, section 401.2(L) to construct a new shed within the prescribed setbacks to the street and a side lot boundary. The subject parcel is 0.41 acres and is located at 68 Hawley Drive (Tax Map 47, Lot 22A) in the “R3” zoning district and is owned by Brad and Donna Rich. After hearing from the applicant and their attorney, this variance was granted.

The Planning Board met once in May on the 25th. Their first item of business was the reorganization of the board (subsequent to Town Meeting on April 30th). David Fracht was elected as board chair again. Dan Kiley was elected vice chair and Phil Vermeer was elected as board secretary. A brief discussion was then held with Nicole Sipe regarding her work to reclaim the gravel pit on Bog Road that she has purchased and is planning to convert into a commercial equestrian facility in the near future. The bulk of the rest of the meeting was spent on discussions centered around the new master plan and the resulting potential for wholesale updates to the Town’s Zoning Ordinance. The board feels that the new master plan will serve as guidance for some significant updates to an ordinance that was originally adopted way back in 1990. This was the first meeting for new board member Tim Jennings, who will bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to the panel. The Enfield Master Planning Task Force (MPTF) met once in May on the 9th. They have now handed all of their ideas, data, input, and feedback to Brandy Saxton of PlaceSense, their master planning contractor. Brandy will take some time to revise and polish all of the rough draft chapters into the finished product we are anticipating. The MPTF will take a summer recess to give Brandy the opportunity to do her work. They will reconvene in about a month to get ready to roll out the end product and to contemplate their next steps. BUILDING INSPECTOR/HEALTH OFFICER

The duties of a building inspector and health officer will commonly interconnect. For instance, the building code has requirements for home design that are intended to ensure an adequate level of life safety for those who live in the home and are familiar with its character, and those who are visitors and unfamiliar. Slips, trips, and falls are among the most frequently reported accidents in the nation. In 2017 falls were the foremost cause of nonfatal injuries and the third leading cause of fatal injuries, according to the National Safety Council. It is estimated that injuries from falls cost Americans more than \$50 billion in medical bills in 2015.

The building codes utilize multiple design requirements in order to prevent falls and avoid injury:

- Stairs need to have uniform heights for each step, and uniform width for each step because studies have shown that, as we walk up or down a flight of stairs our brains will anticipate the next step based on the previous steps. This is especially important when we are carrying a basket of laundry or bags of groceries and cannot see very well where we are stepping.
- Handrails need to extend from the top of stairs all the way to the bottom to provide a grasping surface if one were to stumble at any point. The handrails need to be mounted at a common usable height for average sized people, between 34 and 38 inches above the stair nosing.
- Elevated surfaces such as exterior decks and balconies need to have guard railings to prevent falls to lower levels. These guard railings have specific height and spacing requirements.
- Rooms are required to meet minimum sizes. This is for livability mostly, but also to prevent compressed and cluttered spaces that create tripping obstacles in walking paths.
- Exterior doors must have outdoor lights for those who arrive home or visit others in the dark.
- Other lighting locations are required in stairways, hallways, and basements to minimize trips and falls in dark areas that normally have few windows.
- Electrical outlets are arranged at minimum intervals along walls to prevent the need for cords that, among other problems, create trip hazards for people.
- Bathrooms have clearance requirements in front of showers so that people have space to easily enter and exit the shower without having to twist or turn on a potentially wet surface.
- Doors need to swing away from the top of stairs or have a landing so that one does not open a door and step immediately to a lower surface unexpectedly.

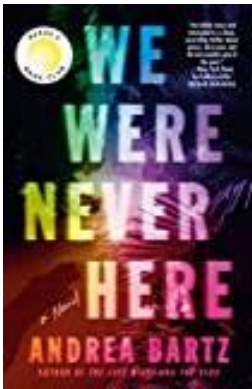

“KNOW YOUR TOWN”

“Know your Town” is presented by the Enfield Heritage Commission. Each month we bring you a bit of insight into the origins of street names or places you see every day and more. Check out “Know your Town” features from [past issues](#)!

“Know Your Heritage Commission”

For the past few months, the Heritage Commission has been bringing you “Know Your Town”. But we haven’t talked about us, so this month the topic is “Know Your Heritage Commission”. When many hear the words “heritage” or “historic preservation” in their hometowns—rather than appealing vacation spots such as Charleston, S.C., Nantucket or the like—they picture “old ladies in tennis shoes” interested only in the past blocking development. As usual, reality is more complex.

Why have a heritage commission?

Preserving and respecting local heritage brings many benefits, both tangible and intangible. Connection with our heritage builds a sense of place and pride in our town’s historic achievements, which residents new and old can share and care for. It can make long-time residents proud of their town’s history. New residents who understand their new hometown’s story and values can be better neighbors and participate more effectively in town life. There are sound economic reasons to preserving natural and architectural beauty. A heritage commission and citizens dedicated to its mission pays off. Tourism is one of New Hampshire’s major businesses as well as the state’s second biggest employer. Heritage travelers tend to stay longer and spend more than other visitors.

Making heritage part of town planning has benefits for locals too. Nationwide, real estate in designated historic districts has higher values, is better maintained and sees fewer [foreclosures](#), which contributes to [economic development](#) and increases local tax bases.

New Hampshire laws on heritage commissions

These benefits are so solid that they are encoded in New Hampshire’s law [RSA 227-C](#). Considering that “the rapid social and economic development of contemporary society threatens the remaining vestiges of this heritage” the state declared it to be public policy and in the public interest “to engage in a comprehensive program of historic preservation to promote the use and conservation of such property for the education, inspiration, pleasure, and enrichment of the citizens of New Hampshire.”

Further consolidating this aim, New Hampshire law made heritage commissions land use boards. This put them on equal footing with zoning, planning and historic districts, which are all codified in Title LXIV “Planning and Zoning” and Chapters 673 and 674 “Land Use Boards” and “Regulatory Powers”.

Chapter 673 establishes the number of members (between three and seven), requirements for members (town residents) and alternates and relations with other municipal boards.

Chapter 674 covers the spirit and activities of heritage commissions, which are reflected in the Enfield Heritage Commission’s mission statement; to “properly recognize, protect, and promote the historic and esthetic resources that are significant to our community, be they natural, built, or cultural.” To do this, heritage commissions can receive gifts of property or money on behalf of the town. They can survey and catalog historic and cultural resources, work with planning boards and other commissions and committees, such as conservation and zoning.

Enfield’s Heritage Commission

Enfield’s Heritage Commission dates to the Enfield Village Association’s application to designate Enfield as a New Hampshire Main Street community, which required a heritage commission as a condition for Main Street status and grant money. At the 2000 town meeting, Enfield voted to create the commission and apply for Main Street designation. Since then, the commission has worked steadily to preserve Enfield’s character and buildings and improve its reputation as a good place to live and visit.

What the Heritage Commission has done for Enfield

At the [2008 Town Meeting](#), Enfield’s Heritage Commission members introduced the warrant article that made downtown Enfield a National Historic Register District. The district creates “economic incentives for renovation” but “impose[s] NO obligation whatsoever upon any new or existing property or upon future property owners”. Owners of buildings in the district can remodel, repaint, or even tear down their property. Being in the district does, however, give non-resident owners access to a 20% tax abatement. The article passed, making Enfield’s district of 193 properties one of the biggest in New Hampshire.

The Heritage Commission has also helped the town of Enfield manage—and save money—its own property. After the town took the 18 High Street property for non-payment of taxes, the Heritage Commission, which recognized the building’s believed historic and aesthetic value, encouraged the town to sell the ramshackle building via sealed bids that prevented demolition of the building. The eventual sale saved the town \$6,000 in demolition costs, netted another \$11,000 in its sale and restored a historic building to the tax rolls.

The Heritage Commission’s groundwork and negotiations with New Hampshire’s Department of Transportation made Lakeside Park possible. Without this intervention, this lot would have been sold for private homes, leaving Enfield residents with access to our town’s beautiful lake at only Shakoma Beach and the boat landing. Today, Enfield and Upper Valley citizens skate, sail and host gatherings at what is now a beautiful gateway linking historic Shaker Bridge and downtown.

Ongoing projects

The Heritage Commission's ongoing and upcoming projects include creating a new historic area. Called the "Enfield Center Triangle" it will include the Town House, Enfield Center's school house and the Union Church. Creating this new area could give Enfield access to grants and funding to restore the Town House from the [New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program](#). In addition, the Heritage Commission is seeking [Certified Local Government status](#), which will give Enfield access to the 10% of New Hampshire's annual appropriation for preservation that is set aside for CLGs. The Heritage Commission will also contribute its experience and expertise to the library renovation and new public safety building.

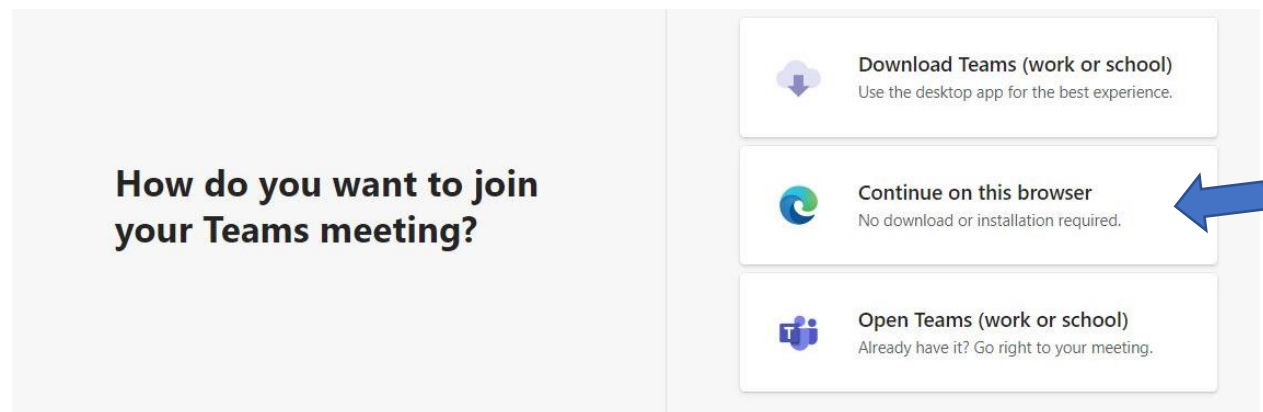

What's a Bonus Pool you ask?

JUNE 4th COVID VACCINE CLINIC AT COMMUNITY LUTHERAN CHURCH

The Community Lutheran Church, 96 Main St in Enfield, NH is hosting a COVID-19 vaccination clinic on Saturday, June 4th from 9 am to 4 pm. Pfizer, Moderna and Janssen (J & J) vaccines will be available. Adults needing 1st, 2nd, 3rd vaccinations or boosters (including those 50+ years or immunocompromised individuals wanting a 2nd booster), children 12-17 years and children 5-11 years can be vaccinated at this clinic. If you have been thinking about getting your first vaccine or any of the follow up vaccines/boosters this is an easy, local place to do so. We hope to see you on June 4th!

The NH Mobile Vaccination Van will set up the clinic in the Fellowship Hall of the church as we did in our prior 3 clinics. Adults must bring their vaccination card (if they have one) and their ID. Children must come with the parent or guardian who can sign a consent form, and an ID (such as their birth certificate, school ID, passport).

People sign up to come during a 1 hour time slot to receive their vaccination. **** Please wear a mask when inside the church. ****

There will be some pop-up advertisements that you can “X” out of so you can see what you need to. After clicking the “signup button for the time slot you want be sure to scroll down and click the “submit” button. Signupgenius will confirm with you by email that you are signed up for the 1 hour time slot you selected. I will also receive this. The 1 hour time slots will accept up to 20-30 people each.

Those people who are scheduled into time slots will be vaccinated first in each time slot. We are going to try to take some walk-ins. **Walk-ins should come between 1 pm and 3:30pm. We cannot guarantee all walk-ins will be vaccinated but we will sure try!!**
