A Message from Enfield's Town Manager


It took until the middle of February for winter to arrive, but it is here now. As I write this update, the snow is coming down outside my office window. Many people are getting out and enjoying the winter sports we have longed for. I have talked with many people that are now taking advantage of the snowmobile trails, ice fishing, and other winter sports that we were wondering if we would get a chance to participate in, this time last month.

Town staff has been very busy finishing the preparation and production of the Town Report. During this past month we worked with the Budget Committee to finalize the proposed 2023 budget, with the Select Board to finalize the warrant and with many people and committees, commissions and boards to finalize the documents for the Town Report.

As many of you may have heard, we are proposing a government general fund operating budget with a larger than normal increase. Exclusive of Special Warrant Articles, the proposed general fund operating budget is an increase of \$718,124, or 12.17% above 2022. The increase is primarily due to the same inflationary pressures, rising prices for materials and services, as all of our residents, which has increased the cost to maintain current levels of service. 4.58% of the total increase is due to the addition of the loan payment for the public safety building that was approved at the 2022 Town Meeting.

In an effort to save time and money while reducing the stress on our employees, you may have noticed that the Department of Public Works (DPW) has implemented a pretreatment program, when the conditions are right. By pretreating roads before certain storms, we have been able to minimize call back of our employees and have realized a slight reduction in the use of deicing product. We will continue to monitor and improve this process to help increase or maintain service levels while reducing costs. I would like to thank the employees of our DPW for their dedication and effort during these winter months, and the ingenuity of those trying to provide better service.

Department & Committee Reports

Building Inspector/Health Officer

The Health Officer recently received training from the manager of the NH Department of Health and Human Services Radon Program about the health hazards of radon gas that residents should be aware of. Radon is the leading environmental cause of cancer mortality in the entire nation, and it is the leading cause of lung cancer in non-smokers and the second-leading cause of lung cancer overall. For those who smoke tobacco, exposure to radon gas will double their risk of developing lung cancer. The NH Radon Program wants residents to know that radon exposure is preventable, that effective mitigation techniques have been developed at the national level, and that testing is available to determine the presence of radon in the home.

Radon is formed from the radioactive decay of uranium. Uranium is a naturally occurring element that exists as a component of some rocks and soil in our state and throughout the country, and when it decays into radon it is easily dissolved into both air and water. During normal bathing and washing the radon in water will vaporize along with steam and be inhaled by home occupants. Because radon is odorless, tasteless and colorless, the only way to determine its presence within the air or water inside a home is to test both substances.

Enfield municipal water is tested for the presence of radon by the Town, but neither the State nor federal government requires testing of private well water. Residents with private wells are encouraged by the State to test their well water regularly every three to five years, and a water analysis can be obtained either from the NH Public Health Laboratory or other NH Accredited Laboratories (such as Endyne locally in Lebanon). Radon test kits for air sampling are usually available in most hardware stores, and the State is currently offering free test kits at https://states.aelabs.com/#/nh while supplies last. There is no known safe level of radon exposure according to the NH Radon Program. For reference the EPA establishes an actionable level of radon exposure at 4.0 pCi/L, and the WHO establishes an actionable level at 2.7 pCi/l. The Health Officer was provided with data from the NH Radon Program that collected results from 2007-2021 testing that included nearly 33,000 tests state-wide, and of those 30% detected radon levels that were higher than the 4.0 pCi/L actionable level. Data from Enfield was not specific as to number of tests conducted in our town, but the results show one in three tests were above actional level.

A certified radon mitigation specialist should be contacted if radon is detected by testing. A radon mitigator is trained to lower radon levels by various methods, including ventilation that extends from under the basement floor to above the roof. NH law 310-A:189-a requires that those who design or install radon mitigation systems be certified with the National Radon Proficiency Program or the National Radon Safety Board. On a final note, one other NH law exists that pertains to radon: RSA 477:4-a requires that prior to executing a contract for the sale of real estate, the seller must provide the buyer with a statement about radon testing and mitigation techniques.

Conservation Commission

The Enfield Conservation Commission recommends a yes vote on the following Articles:

Article 5, recommended by the Planning Board also, establishes a setback of one hundred feet (100) from all designated Prime Wetlands in Enfield for all construction. This is to protect the water supply from contamination. All homes in Enfield depend upon ground water from aquifers for their water supply. All

of the municipal water supply wells are receiving their water after it passes through Prime Wetlands. There are 5 municipal wells in Enfield. Marsh well 1 and 2, Prior well 1 and 2 and the McConnell well. All of these wells are located along Route 4. Map # 2 in the Natural Resources Inventory, published by the Enfield Conservation Commission in 2021 shows these wells' close proximity to Prime Wetlands. This article will be voted on by ballot on March 14th during the ballot voting portion of Town Meeting.

Article 15, presented by petition from the Enfield Conservation Commission, requests that 10 % of the current use fees (land use change tax) up to five thousand dollars (5,000) per year, pursuant to RSA 79-A:25, be deposited into the Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III. The Conservation Commission needs these funds to maintain trails, repair bridges on trails, repair walk ways on trails, place signage along trails to facilitate their use by Citizens in keeping with the Recreation component of the Master Plan. This Article will be voted on at the March 18, 2023 Town Meeting.

Article 16, presented by petition from the Enfield Conservation Commission, requests the establishment of a Town Forest under RSA 31: 110 on one hundred (100) acres of property owned by the Town on Methodist Hill, Tax Map # 2, Lot # 29. If passed this Town Forest will be managed by the Conservation Commission under the provisions of RSA 31:112 for the purpose of recreation, and hunting. While the Citizens of Enfield East of HWY 89 have numerous parks and trails for outdoor activities, those Citizens of Enfield West of HWY 89 have limited land for recreation due primarily to the development that has occurred in that area. The opportunity to preserve the 100 acres should not be lost. This Article will be voted on at the March 18, 2023 Meeting.

If you are currently using Liberty or Eversource as your electricity supplier**, you will be AUTOMATICALLY enrolled into Enfield Community Power's DEFAULT option. You do not need to act if you are satisfied with that option.

Guidance for specific customers, such as those who have installed solar and are on net metering plans, can be found in our **Frequently Asked Questions**.

**Customers of the NH Electric Cooperative will remain on its energy supply service unless they choose to join Enfield Community Power (ECP) on an opt-in basis.

Two of our members, Drew Burse and Mark Olsen, have been attending the Southwest Regional Hazmat Team meetings representing the Enfield Fire Department. This organization is made up of multiple towns

in our area and has the resources and manpower required to respond to a hazmat situation if it is beyond our capabilities. This is particularly important where we are responsible for a section of I-89 with a variety of cargos traveling through.

We will have the renovated Forestry Truck completed and in service before the end of March and will be planning an evening for people to come and view. Stay tuned.

WARRANT ARTICLE FOR LOCAL HISTORIC DISTRICT

The Enfield Heritage Commission has submitted a warrant article on this year's Town Warrant to create a Local Historic District in Enfield Center consisting of the three historic buildings in Enfield Center: Union Church, Center Town House, and Center Schoolhouse. The Church and Town House are listed on the National Register of Historic Places and the Schoolhouse is eligible for that status. This article has been recommended by the Planning Board and has the full support of the Union Church, Enfield Historical Society (owners of the two buildings not owned by the Town) and the Enfield Village Association. There is no impact on the tax base since all three buildings are tax exempt. If passed, this article will simply be an overlay to current zoning.

Why is this important? Here are a few reasons for voting to approve this article:

- To enable Enfield to apply for grant funds that would otherwise not be available to the Town without a Local Historic District.
- To strengthen and build economic development of the Town of Enfield by protecting and enhancing the attractiveness of the community to residents, tourists, and visitors.
- To safeguard the heritage of our Town by providing protection of the structures representing significant elements of its cultural, social, economic, political, and architectural history.
- To foster public appreciation of, and civic pride in, the beauty of our Town and the accomplishments of its historic past.
- To conserve property values within our Town while promoting the use of structures within the Local Historic District for the education, pleasure, prosperity, and general welfare of the community.

The Heritage Commission welcomes your input and hopes you will vote to approve this warrant article.

Land Use & Community Development

Planning Board - The Planning Board held formal hearings on February 22nd for two land use cases. They were as follows:

Land Use Case # P23-02-01, pursuant to RSA 231:158 concerning a designated scenic road in the Town of Enfield. A PRESENTATION and HEARING was held regarding an application from the NH Electric COOP (NHEC) to cut trees and maintain vegetation on Boys Camp Road, a designated scenic road. The Planning Board approved this application.

Land Use Case # P23-02-02, Nick Loupis applied for Boundary Line Adjustment and Voluntary Lot Merger approval for his properties located on Lake Street. The parcels in question (map 30, lots 17 & 19) are located within the "R1" Residential zoning district. The Planning Board approved this application.

The Planning Board (PB) is beginning the work of reviewing the Enfield Zoning Ordinance for possible updates. Using the new Enfield Master Plan as a guiding document, the PB will use their work sessions for the foreseeable future to look at possibly revamping the entire ordinance. The beginnings of this work have the board reviewing the Town's GIS maps and discussing the layout of Enfield's zoning districts. Public participation is encouraged throughout this process. Feel free to attend any Planning Board meeting to be a part of this important process.

Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) - No hearings were held in February.

Road Postings

The Town of Enfield posted all Town maintained roads effective at noon on Wednesday, February 15, 2023. All vehicles that weigh over 6 tons are prohibited from accessing these roads until the posting is rescinded, usually around May 1st. The State of New Hampshire has posted Shaker Hill Road and Main Street. Limited permission for access will be granted on a case-by-case basis with factors such as weather, truck size, time of day, etc., being taken into consideration. Those wishing to access Main Street or Shaker Hill Road should call the NH DOT District 2 office at 448-2654

Winter Ban

The Enfield Board of Selectmen wishes to remind citizens of Enfield that the Winter Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 through April 1.

No vehicle shall at any time be parked on any public or publicly maintained street, alley, roadway or way open to the public, in a manner that hinders in any fashion the maintenance of the way.

Driveway Snow Placement

A reminder that it is unlawful to plow snow across any and all Town roads or to deposit snow within the traveled portion of a Town road pursuant to RSA 236:20, Paragraph VII, and RSA 41:11.

Driveway sand is available at the DPW during their business hours (Monday-Friday from 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM) and is located at the top of the driveway in the bin on the right. It is open to Enfield residents with a current Transfer Station Sticker. It is not intended for commercial applicators or to be taken in commercial volumes. Salt, ledge sand and materials in the shed are NOT available.

Aerosol cans, empty: Recycle with scrap metal. Talk to your town. (Bring cans with product in them to collection.)

Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636.

Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is hazardous to your health—don't remove it yourself!

Batteries, alkaline: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal to avoid fire in your trash!

Batteries, automotive: Take to parts store for cash or your transfer station Fire extinguishers: Recycle empty extinguishers (NRRA takes from towns). Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town. Food Co-ops and Home Depot may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes. Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint; throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex. Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling." Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector—can become a projectile if compacted in trash. Lebanon Police Station accepts some sharps.

Medicine: See **www.twinstatesafemeds.com** for police stations taking meds. **Propane or helium tanks:** Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks.

Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

Bears

With the change of season bears will be around looking for an early spring snack. Please see the brochure put out by the New Hampshire Fish and Game to help minimize conflicts and interactions with bears.

New Hampshire's Black Bear

The American black bear (Ursus americanus), which has made a remarkable recovery from record low numbers in the mid-1800s, is now common throughout New Hampshire. The statewide bear population is estimated at 5,600 and regional densities range between 0.1-1.0 bears/mi2 and average 0.6 bears/mi2.

Although black bears are generally shy and usually avoid humans, they are opportunistic and will seek out human-related foods particularly when natural foods are limited. Minimizing conflicts between bears and people is critically important and a high priority for wildlife managers. Maintaining a strong and sustainable bear population into the future will depend on a public that is motivated to be responsible and proactive in securing food attractants.

Bears are part of our native heritage and for many, serve as a symbol of wildness and an indicator of quality, diverse habitat. Bears are highly intelligent, resourceful, and very effective at locating high-quality food resources. They are a prized big game animal and valued for both their meat and hide. A black bear sighting typically leaves wildlife watchers and tourists fascinated, particularly when they come from areas where bears are less common. From an ecological standpoint, bears serve important roles. As an opportunistic feeder, they help clean up carcasses of animals that die due to various causes. As an animal that feeds on a tremendous diversity of tree and shrub species, they serve as a significant seed disperser. Bears fill an essential niche and they are an important component of our landscape.


