TOWN HALL OFFICE REORGANIZATION

The installation of a second Town Clerk station has helped reduce wait times for people registering vehicles, and doing other transactions with the Town Clerk. The downside is the confusion this has caused when customers need to see someone in the Town Manager's Office now that there isn't space at the front counter for us...down the hall, turn right, hang another slight right – *yes, you are welcome to come in the office!* – you get the idea. To provide a friendlier presentation and make it easier for everyone to find us and easier for us to serve you, we will be doing a bit of office reorganization. Counters will be moved, staff members and their associated desks, computers, phones, file cabinets, and more, will be relocated. Office partitions will be put up to help reduce the sound that carries across the office. MUNICIPAL FACILITIES OPTIMIZATION STUDY – NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE

An electronic copy of the final report prepared by Barrett Architecture for Phase 1 of the Municipal Facilities Optimization Study has been posted on the Town's website: <https://www.enfield.nh.us/home/pages/municipal-facilities-optimization-study>

It is important to reiterate that the contents of Barrett Architecture's presentation (and forthcoming report) are the first phase of what will be a multi-phase/deliberative process. The Town retained the services of Barrett Architecture (Phase 1) to complete an independent and objective evaluation of our current facilities, our facility needs, and related alternatives that the Town could/should consider moving forward. The subsequent findings and recommendations furnished by Barrett Architecture will now be thoroughly examined, deliberated, and used to guide future information gathering (and public input) as we collectively progress with a comprehensive analysis that is completed prior to any formal proposals ultimately being presented to voters at a future Town Meeting.

Along these lines, an advisory group (Municipal Facilities Advisory Committee or “MFAC” for short) was recently assembled to begin addressing the next phase of this effort. The MFAC is comprised of nine members, including the following individuals

The committee is charged with developing cost-effective strategies that enable the Town facilities to meet their service delivery needs in both the mid- and long-term while still ensuring that potential investments in new projects reflect fiscal responsibility and use external funding sources (i.e., federal and state grants) to the fullest extent possible in order to minimize the Town’s financial commitment. Committee meetings will be open to the public, and all meetings will be publicly posted at least 24 hours in advance.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Water and Sewer Bills

Enfield water and sewer bills were mailed in early April and will be due May 10. This billing will mark the transition from a 10% onetime penalty charged on past due balances to an 8% annual percentage rate accrued daily on all past due balances. Landlords wishing to charge tenants for water and sewer bills directly are responsible for forwarding bills and are ultimately responsible for current and past due bills. Bills can be monitored and paid using the online payment tool on the Town's Website.

Cemeteries

Cemeteries are open. Please contact the Cemetery Trustees and the Enfield Grounds Department to schedule a burial. Please keep all decorations in line with the headstones to allow mowing operations to take place.

Composting Bins

The Town has a limited number of composting bins and food scrap buckets for sale this spring. Please see Dave at the Enfield Transfer Station for details.

Brush and Yard Waste

The Enfield Brush and Yard Waste Facility reopened on May 1, 2019 and will be open during the business hours of the DPW or Transfer Station Monday through Saturday. The facility is closed on Sundays. The facility can take clean brush and limbs up to 8" and leaves and yard waste. The Town cannot take any invasive plant species, stumps or dimensional lumber. ***Residents wishing to use the facility must stop at the DPW office or the Transfer Station to have all loads checked by Town staff.*** The facility cannot take commercial volumes.

Construction and Demolition Material (C & D)

The Enfield Transfer Station and Enfield Vegetative Management Facility do **NOT** accept any volumes of C & D at this time. These materials are **no longer accepted by the Lebanon Landfill as of May 1**. 2019 Transfer Station Stickers Available

The 2019 Transfer Station window stickers are available at the Town Office and the Transfer Station. An Enfield vehicle permit sticker must be affixed to the window of your car or truck on the side window behind the front passenger's seat, or with regular cab pick-ups in the lower corner of the rear window behind the passenger. Permit stickers are available, free of charge, at the Enfield Transfer Station & Recycling Center or Enfield Town Offices. Proof of residency or property ownership is required.

Enfield permit stickers also permit you to use the town beach parking lot on Mascoma Lake.

Punch Cards for Transfer Station Fees

The Town is working on establishment of a punch card system for Transfer Station fees. The new system should reduce wait times for residents. Punch cards will be available at the Public Works building payable by check only. Punch cards will also be available at the Enfield Town Offices, payable by cash or check. Look for an announcement on our website at www.enfield.nh.us

Road Postings

The Town of Enfield has lifted all road postings except Hazen Road, Smith Pond Road and Old Route 10. It is expected that the postings on these three will be lifted within the week.

Please Use Curbside Trash and Recycling Services

Trash and Zero-Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station costs the Town of Enfield significantly more per ton than trash and recycling collected curbside due to extra hauling charges. Trash collected at the Transfer Station costs approximately \$30 per ton more than material collected curbside (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included). Zero-Sort recycling collected at the Transfer Station costs the Town over \$80 per ton more than recycling collected at curbside due to the extra hauling fees (when Transfer Station transportation fees are included).

Please do your part to help keep our solid waste expenses down (and keep property tax rates as low as possible in the process)!

Hydrant Flushing

Hydrant flushing will begin in May. The Town routinely flushes water from the system to improve water quality and test emergency fire hydrant readiness. If you experience a loss of pressure it should only be temporary. Please wait 30 minutes before contacting the Town. This does not pertain to properties on NH Rte 4A and in Shaker Village that are serviced by sewer only.

Alkaline batteries: Most non-rechargeable batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, and 9-volt) are trash in NH. If in doubt, just bring to collection. Tape 9-volt terminals before disposal.

Ammunition and explosives: State Police at 271-3636.

Asbestos: Get a licensed asbestos specialist. Asbestos is hazardous to your health—don't even think about removing it yourself!

Automotive batteries: Take to parts store for cash back or your transfer station

Empty aerosol cans: Can be recycled with scrap metal. Talk to your town.

Fluorescent lights: May be taken at your town facility. Check with your town.

Food Co-ops and Home Depot take may take CFLs (spiral bulbs), not tubes.

Latex paint: Use kitty litter, sawdust, or shredded paper to dry out latex paint, then throw in your trash. Empty, dry metal cans may be recycled as scrap metal at your recycling facility. If it says "clean up with soap and water," it's latex.

Medicine: See www.twinstatesafemeds.com for police stations taking meds.

Medical sharps: Place in a rigid container (e.g. detergent bottle), seal cap with duct tape, and label container with marker, "Sharps, not for recycling."

Dispose of with regular trash by handing to a waste collector. See

www.nh.gov/medsafety. Can drop off at Lebanon Police Station.

Propane or helium tanks and fire extinguishers: Propane/helium tanks can be exchanged/refilled at a distributor; or contact town transfer station about empty tanks. Empty fire extinguishers can be recycled (NRRRA takes from towns).

Used motor oil: Take to town transfer station or a service station for recycling.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department is happy to announce the start of a citizen academy. May is motorcycle safety awareness month; with the warm weather more motorcycles will be out on the roads. Please be safe, double check your blind spots, and when cutting your grass do not blow it out onto the road as this is very dangerous for riders of motorcycles and bicycles.

As you make plans for Mother's Day (May 12) please consider going to the Enfield/Canaan woman's self defense class that will be held at the Canaan Police Department from 1:00-3:00 PM. This class is a basic self defense class free to woman of all ages. For more information, please contact either the Enfield or Canaan Police Department (603-523-7400).

It's that time of year again where we get many calls about bears and other wild animals in trash or even trying to get into houses. Please bring in bird feeders and secure your trash. This can be done by using cords/straps or putting the bins inside a shed or garage at night. If you prevent wild animals from finding a food source now, you may prevent a summer long issue for you and your neighbors. A reminder that Enfield does have a trash ordinance that requires trash bins to be placed curbside no sooner than the night prior and need to be removed the same day as trash pickup.

Finally, as the weather gets warmer and you venture out, please do not use your electronic devices as you drive. Distracted driving and speed still remains the major cause of many of our motor vehicle crashes.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

We are rapidly approaching brush fire season. Remember that permits are needed to burn brush, and a yearly permit is required for campfires. Please reach out to a Warden to obtain a permit prior to burning. The list of Wardens who can write permits can be found here:

The Enfield Firefighters Association recently donated \$1,700 from its fundraising monies to purchase new water backpacks to assist with brush fires. These are much more comfortable than the old metal backpacks that were used. They will be easier for staff to carry for extended periods of time while fighting brush and forest fires.

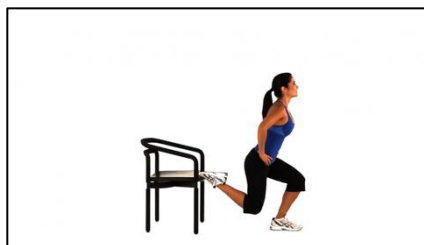
You may have noticed the big dumpsters in the parking lot of the Union St station. Department members have been busy cleaning out the fire station. We hope to complete the cleanout process in the next couple of weeks. We are also in the process of moving out of the Shedd Street garage. The Board of Selectmen voted to surplus the old Engine 3, as well as the old forestry truck. They should be put out to bid soon. Most of the equipment has been moved from the Shedd Street garage, and we will be getting the rest out soon.

Through a cooperative effort with the Town, the Fire Department will be taking delivery of 10 new airpacks in a few weeks at a cost of approximately \$67,000. These units replace 15 year old equipment that is costing more and more to maintain. The Town set aside \$30,000 (\$15,000 from the CIP Capital Reserve and \$15,000 from a donation procured by the Town) to replace air bottles that were expiring. 20 expiring air bottles were purchased, and there was a little over \$11,000 in remaining funds. The Board of Selectmen authorized use of those funds toward the new airpacks. The Firefighters Association received a donation of \$20,000 toward this purchase. The Association then voted to donate \$34,925 from its fundraising monies to complete the purchase of the 10 airpacks. This new equipment will greatly improve firefighter safety.

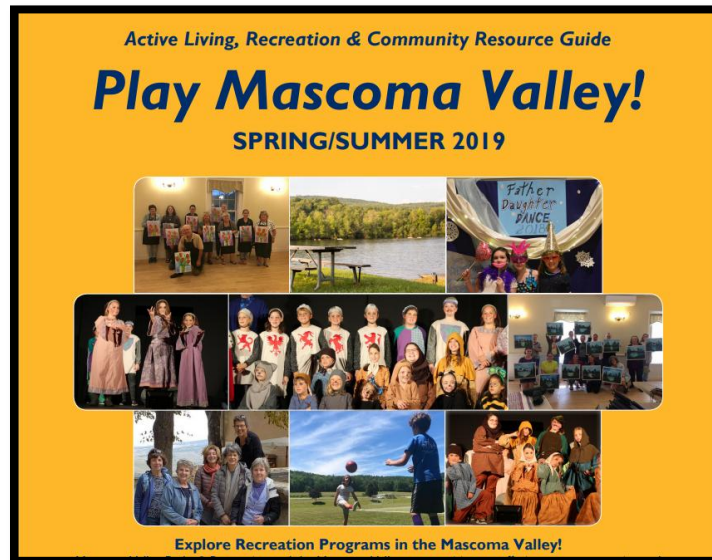

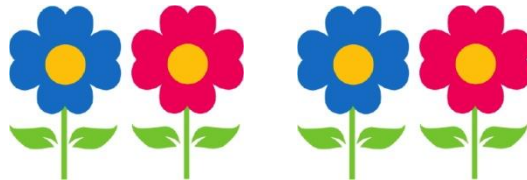


May 4th Landscape Painting

BUILDING AND FIRE INSPECTOR

As the weather warms we will soon be enjoying outdoor activities which include pools. I have listed a few things to keep in mind as you prepare these for use.

1. Any pool under 4 feet in height is required to have a fence installed around the perimeter.
2. The fence shall have a locking and self latching gate.
3. Pools 4 feet and over in height shall have the ladder removed or made unusable when unattended.
4. Consider installing a pool alarm that goes off when anyone enters the pool.
5. Contact your homeowners insurance to verify that the pool is included in your policy.

6. Establish and enforce rules and safe behaviors, such as “no diving”, “swim with a buddy” and “walk please”.
7. Ensure everyone in the home knows how to swim and respond to pool emergencies by having appropriate safety equipment and training.

PLANNING & ZONING OFFICES

The Enfield Planning Board met on April 24. Although two conceptual hearings were scheduled on the agenda, both had to be postponed at the applicant’s request. There was also one public hearing on the agenda, which pertained to the construction of a new golf cart storage building on the Montcalm Golf Club property near the existing Club House (2 Smith Pond Road; Conservation Zoning District). A motion to accept the plan as presented was approved unanimously. Business items also included further review of the Planning Board Rules of Procedure.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) met on April 9 to review a variance request related to converting an existing single-family home to a duplex (18 Lake Street; Map 34 Lot 7). The existing building sits on a nonconforming 0.16-acre lot and the proposed conversion would increase the size of the structure (increasing the existing nonconformity). The ZBA ultimately voted to table a decision on the application until its May meeting (May 14) to allow for more time to review. The ZBA also was presented with a request for a special exception by Enfield Land Company, as required under Section 403-7. A. and D of the zoning ordinance, to construct a 54’x100’ shed at the Montcalm Golf Course (2 Smith Pond Road; Map 6 Lot 31) in the Conservation District. The special exception was unanimously approved.

All information is public and available at the Planning and Zoning Office in the DPW building at 74 Lockhaven Road.

MASCOMA LAKESIDE PARK – THE PROPERTY HAS BEEN PURCHASED!

It is with great pleasure that we report the Town successfully closed on the sale of the Mascoma Lakeside Park property from NH DOT in early-March. This milestone has been made possible by the commitment and dedication of many volunteers comprising the Mascoma Lakeside Park Committee, and of course the residents, businesses, charitable foundations, and other interested parties who have made monetary donations to this project. It is an enormous achievement to be able to acquire this property exclusively with privately raised funds and manage it as a public park in perpetuity.



Now that the sale has been finalized, our focus is squarely on amenities for the park. This past fall we actively solicited public input through a series of meetings with local organizations, town committees, and a well-attended public forum held at the Community Building. The top priority for all stakeholders is that the natural beauty of

the site be preserved and not over-developed. Some improvements are also needed and desired. They include removing and replacing brush and trash trees with native shrubs and trees; creating trails and educational signage to enhance recreational use of the property; constructing rainwater gardens and a new retaining wall to protect the water quality of the lake; installing a children's wading/swimming area; improved parking; installing grill boxes, and; building an open pavilion (which will likely include a fire feature of some

sort) that can serve as a gathering place and an educational facility.

As has been previously reported, the Town of Enfield was recently awarded a Northern Borders Regional Commission grant in the amount of roughly \$135,000 to help fund improvements to the park property. This federal grant is a “match’ grant, and the total project budget is approximately \$270,000. We have until July, 2019 to raise \$135,000 in matching funds, at which point we will receive whatever portion of the \$135,000 we have matched. Our fundraising tally is approximately \$253,000. This leaves us with approximately \$118,000 of our \$135,000 goal to fund planned improvements once the \$128,600 sale price and other purchase-related fees are deducted. So, we are well on our way to achieving our \$135,000 goal, but **we still have to raise approximately \$17,000 over the next few months to secure 100% of the federal matching grant.** Your generous support is needed!

Toters

The trash and recycling toters are part of the Enfield trash and recycling collection program and must remain with the property upon a property

transfer. The Town has had to replace many of these containers that people have taken with them after selling their properties.

Recycling Fees

The Town of Enfield charges fees for items that the Town gets charged for to dispose of including CFC units, tires, TVs, computers, electronics, fire extinguishers, propane tanks and microwave ovens. Lately a number of people have been trying to “sneak” items into the Transfer Station to avoid paying these fees. It is very important to dispose of these items properly not only for the health of the Town budget but the safety of the operators and people at the Transfer Station and down the trash and recycling streams. Many of these items contain hazardous materials which is the reason for the fee. Hiding hazardous materials in bags going into a compactor or placing them in the metal container that will be run through a grinder could result in a serious injury. Water Saving Tips to Help You Save Money on Your Next Water/Sewer Bill

1. *Check faucets and pipes for leaks.* A small drip from a worn faucet washer can waste 20 gallons of water per day. Larger leaks can waste hundreds of gallons.
2. *Check your toilets for leaks.* Put a little food coloring in your toilet tank. If, without flushing, the color begins to appear in the bowl within 30 minutes, you have a leak that should be repaired immediately. Most replacement parts are inexpensive and easy to install.
3. *Use your water meter to check for hidden water leaks.* Read the house water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, there is a leak.
4. *Install water-saving shower heads and low-flow faucet aerators.* Inexpensive water-saving low-flow shower heads or restrictors are easy for the homeowner to install. Long, hot showers can use five to ten gallons every unneeded minute. "Low-flow" means it uses less than 2.5 gallons per minute (gpm). Also, all household faucets should be fit with low-flow aerators. 2.5 gpm may be needed in a kitchen sink but bathroom faucets and other water outlets should be 1.5 gpm or lower. Check gpm rating on packaging to be sure the advertised “low-flow” is at or below these levels. This single best home water conservation method is also the least expensive!
5. *Insulate your water pipes.* It's easy and inexpensive to insulate your water pipes with pre-slit foam pipe insulation. You'll get hot water faster plus avoid wasting water while it heats up.
6. *Take shorter showers.* One way to cut down on water use is to turn off

the shower after soaping up, then turn it back on to rinse. A four-minute shower uses approximately 20 to 40 gallons of water. Limit your showers to the time it takes to soap up, wash down and rinse off.

7. *Turn off the water after you wet your toothbrush.* There is no need to keep the water running while brushing your teeth. Just wet your brush and fill a glass for mouth rinsing.
8. *Rinse your razor in the sink.* Fill the sink with a few inches of warm water. This will rinse your razor just as well as running water, with far less waste of water.
9. *Use your dishwasher and clothes washer for only full loads.* Automatic dishwashers and clothes washers should be fully loaded for optimum water conservation. Most makers of dishwashing soap recommend not pre-rinsing dishes which is a big water savings. With clothes washers, avoid the permanent press cycle, which uses an added 20 liters (5 gallons) for the extra rinse. For partial loads, adjust water levels to match the size of the load. Replace old clothes washers. New Energy Star rated washers use 35 - 50% less water and 50% less energy per load. If you're in the market for a new clothes washer, consider buying a water-saving frontload washer.
10. *Keep a bottle of drinking water in the fridge.* Running tap water to cool it off for drinking water is wasteful. Store drinking water in the fridge in a safe drinking bottle.

How to Improve Recycling

FIRE DEPARTMENT AND FIRE INSPECTOR

Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors do provide an early warning, helping to prevent a potential disaster. Batteries should never be removed from the unit for any reason and if the alarm sounds we must take advantage of the time it is giving us to vacate the building. They are our early warning system, do not second guess them. **Call 911 immediately.**

Detectors generally have a 10 year life expectancy before they need to be replaced. Batteries should be changed twice a year, change the clock, change the battery.

All fire departments within the Mascoma School District carry Smoke and C/O Detectors that can be left with homeowners in the event that a faulty unit is found during a call, no one should be left unprotected. These units have been generously provided free of charge to the departments by the Assembly of God Church in Canaan. Other donors are always needed, as to date we have given out over 120 units. If anyone is interested in participating or has further questions about Smoke and C/O Detectors do not hesitate to contact this office.

Clothes Dryer Safety

Doing laundry is most likely part of your every day routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.

AND DON'T FORGET...

Dryers should be properly **grounded**.

Check the **outdoor vent** flap to make sure it is not covered by snow.

Keep the area around your dryer **clear** of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.

Clothes that have come in contact with **flammable substances**, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

- ❗ The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.

The supplies can be kept in a plastic tub, small suitcase, trash can, backpack or other container. To learn what else you need in an emergency supplies kit, go to www.ready.gov.

EMERGENCY SUPPLIES KIT:

- ☐ Water – one gallon per person per day for drinking and sanitation — store 3-day supply
- ☐ Ready-to-eat food, canned juices, comfort/stress foods — at least a 3-day supply
- ☐ Battery-powered or hand-cranked radio and a NOAA weather radio, and extra batteries for both
- ☐ Flashlights and extra batteries
- ☐ First aid kit
- ☐ Non-prescription drugs such as pain reliever, anti-diarrhea medication, antacid, laxative
- ☐ Prescription medications, contact lenses and supplies, denture needs
- ☐ Whistle to signal for help
- ☐ Infant formula and diapers, if you have an infant
- ☐ Water and pet food if you have pets
- ☐ Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- ☐ Dust mask or cotton t-shirt to filter the air
- ☐ Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- ☐ Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- ☐ Can opener for food
- ☐ Aluminum foil
- ☐ A jacket or coat, hat and gloves
- ☐ A complete change of clothing including long pants, long sleeve shirt, and sturdy shoes stored in a waterproof container.
- ☐ Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- ☐ Rain gear
- ☐ Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils
- ☐ Cash or traveler's checks, change
- ☐ Paper towels
- ☐ Tent
- ☐ Compass
- ☐ Matches in a waterproof container
- ☐ Signal flare
- ☐ Paper, pencil
- ☐ Personal hygiene items
- ☐ Soap
- ☐ Disinfectant and household chlorine bleach
- ☐ Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container. Remember to include emergency contact numbers.
- ☐ Passport, bank account numbers, credit card account numbers and companies
- ☐ Books, games puzzles, portable music device

NOTE: Replace food every six months. Re-think your kit and family needs once a year. Replace batteries and update clothes, etc.

Have children create their personal pack. Have them include things like their favorite book or stuffed animal. These familiar things will help keep them comfortable during an emergency.

Smoke Alarms at Home

SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.



SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- ❗ A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- ❗ Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- ❗ Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
