A Summary of Enfield and Lebanon Perambulation Reports From 1847 To 1924

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Lebanon Charter July 4th 1761

.....butted and bounded as follows (VIZ): Beginning at a white Pine Tree marked with the figures three on one side and four on the other, which tree is about eighteen miles on a point from the upper end of Charleston, and stands on the bank of Connecticut river, from thence South, seventy-two degrees East six miles; from thence North, thirty-six degrees East five miles and one half; from thence North sixty-four West seven miles to Connecticut River, To a hemlock tree marked four and five that stands just at the head of white river falls; from thence down the river to the first bound mentioned; and that the same be & hereby is incorporated into a Township by the name of Lebanon;.....

Enfield Charter July 4th 1761

"beginning at the south-east corner of Lebanon, from thence south sixty-eight degrees east, six miles and three fourths of a mile; thence north forty-three degrees east, five miles and one half; thence north fifty-eight degrees west, seven miles and one half, to the north-east corner of Lebanon; from thence by the east side of Lebanon to the first bound mentioned."

Enfield Boundary Lines Corrected ¹

1781

On the 5th January ,1781, the proprietors of the township of Canaan applied to the government of the State by petition, stating that upon running out the township of Enfield, according to the charter, that township was found to include a portion of the territory which had been reputed to be within the limits of Canaan; that upon examination, it was found that there was a gore of land between Grantham and Enfield which had not been granted by the government, but which had been left un-granted by a mistake in the charter of Enfield, in inserting "sixty-eight degrees" instead of fifty-eight degrees, as the course of one of the lines of the township, and that this mistake **"interfered with and confounded" all the lines of the adjoining towns**, wherefore they prayed that the said mistake might be corrected.

Upon this petition a day of hearing was appointed, and notice was ordered to be given to the selectmen of Grantham, Grafton and Enfield.

On the 22d March, 1781, a committee of the legislature reported that there was a clerical mistake in the point of compass of the line in the southerly side of Enfield; and recommended that a committee of three judicious persons be appointed to adjust the disputes that had arisen between the townships of Canaan, Grafton and Enfield, in consequence of the said mistake, and to run out the lines and make the boundaries between the several parties in a just and equitable manner.

This report was accepted, and on the 28th March, 1781, an act was passed appointing three persons to run out the township of Enfield and make the proper boundaries thereof, and also the boundaries of Canaan and Grafton that were contiguous to Enfield, and declaring that the report of the committee, or the major part of them, being made to the secretary's office within one year, should be binding and conclusive in law upon all parties and persons whatever.

In 1801, the proprietors and selectmen of Enfield, presented a petition to the general court, stating that the committee appointed by the said act of March 28, 1781, made a report within the time limited in the same act, which report had been lost, and praying that a copy of the report might be filed with the secretary.

A similar petition was presented by the proprietors and selectmen of Canaan.

Upon these petitions a day of hearing was appointed, of which public notice, and notice to the selectmen of Grantham and Grafton, was ordered to be given.

And on the 18th June 1802, an act was passed, declaring that a copy of the report of said committee, by which the said mistake was corrected, and the line between Enfield and Grantham established as running south fifty eight degrees east, be received and recorded by the secretary, and that the same be as effectual for the establishment of the boundaries of the towns of Enfield, Grafton and Canaan, as though the original report had been returned within the time prescribed.

It was stated by the committee in the said report, that the lines were established with the consent of all concerned.

The township of Grantham as described in the charter, which was dated June 8, 1767, is bounded as follows:--- "Beginning at the south west corner of Enfield, from thence south fifty-eight degrees east, by the south line of Enfield six miles and three fourths of a mile, to the south east corner thereof, from thence south forty-one degrees west five miles and three fourths of a mile, &c. to the bound first mentioned."

Establishing the Line Between Lebanon And Enfield²

1786

Whareas, we the Subscribers Being oppinted a Committee by the Honor^{bl} General Assembly of said State to Establish the Boundaries between the towns of Lebanon and Enfield have meet accordingly upon said towns and after Due Examination of the Bounds and Lins of s^d towns of Lebanon and infield. Porceeded as followeth, firstly begain at a white Pine tree marked on the Easterly Bank of Conacutt River which is Caled the agreement tree between s^d Lebanon and Plainfield and thence mesured easterly on the line Between s^d Lebanon and Plainfield six milds to a Stake and Stone Commonly Known by the name of Sumners Bound then Examined the Lins and Records shewen us Between s^d Lebanon and Enfield and find a Bound Standing at the Northeasterly Corner of s^d Lebanon Comonnly Known by the name of the Birch tree, but s^d tree being fell Down a Stake and Stons Eracted in the place whare said Birch tree stood; and we Do Establish the first said Stake and Stons Coled Sumnors Bound to be a Bound between s^d Lebanon and infield on the Southerly Side of s^d towns and the said Birch tree (now Stake and Stons) to be the northerly Bounds between s^d Lebanon and infield, and **Do order that a Strat Line be Drawen between s^d Sumnors** Bond and said Birch tree or Stake standing in the place of said Birch to be the Deviding Line between said Lebanon and said infield, and have Recommended to said Committee to settle with all Pursons who are on Land in ether of s^d towns which shall fall out of the town which he settled in the best way which thay Can according to ower orders from s^d Gen^{ll} assembly

Enfield/Lebanon/Hanover/Canaan Town Line Corner Monument

Summery from the Enfield/Lebanon and Lebanon/Hanover perambulation reports:

1800 Lebanon/Hanover report

To the northeast corner bound of Lebanon and the southeast corner of Hanover which is a stake and stones. The stake is marked on the westerly side H + CC and on the southerly side L. 1800. TW. GB + C.

1847 Enfield/Lebanon report

To the charter bound, being the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield being a stake and stones marked L+E.

1854 Enfield/Lebanon report

To an oak stake with stones about it being the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield and marked L.E. W.G.P. U.P. 1854. [Signed by a surveyor.]

1861 Enfield/Lebanon report

1875 Enfield/Lebanon report

To a cedar post and stones being the north/east corner of Lebanon and the northwest corner of Enfield.

1875 Lebanon/Hanover report

To a cedar post, marked, standing at the S.E. corner of Hanover and the N.E. corner of Lebanon.

1882 Enfield/Lebanon report

To the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield.

1889 Enfield/Lebanon report

To a cedar post and stones being the north/east corner of Lebanon and the northwest corner of Enfield.

1896 Lebanon/Hanover report

To a split stake and heap of stones standing in the north east corner of Lebanon and south east corner of Hanover.

1903 Enfield/Lebanon report

Across said lake to a cedar post supported by a spruce stake and surrounded by stones. Standing in the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield marked L+E with various other marks. And being the established corner of the four towns Lebanon, Enfield, Canaan, and Hanover. Said bound stands near a fence and a large [maple], oak tree.

1908 Lebanon/Hanover report "Record of setting stone bounds on line between Hanover and Lebanon"

On Friday December fourth 1908 C. S. Ford for the town of Lebanon and D. S. Bridgman for the town of Hanover erected a bound the same as above described. {Said bound being about six inches square and six feet long. A V [chisled] sunk letter L about four inches high being on the south side and a V [chisled] sunk letter H of the same size being on the north side of said bound.} At the south east corner of the town of Hanover and the north east corner of the town of Lebanon.

1910 Enfield/Lebanon report

Across said lake **to a granite post marked L, H, C, E,** standing in the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield. And being the established corner of the four towns Lebanon, Enfield, Canaan, and Hanover. Said bound stands near a fence and a large maple tree.

1910 Lebanon/Hanover report

To a granite post marked L and H standing in the north easterly corner of Lebanon and the south easterly corner of Hanover and being the established corner bound of the four towns. Hanover, Canaan, Enfield, and Lebanon. Said bound stands near a board fence and a large Maple tree.

1917 Enfield/Lebanon report

Across Mascoma Lake to a granite post marked L, H, C, E, standing in the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield. And being the established corner of the four towns Lebanon, Enfield, Canaan, and Hanover. Said bound stands near a board fence and a large maple tree.

1917 Lebanon/Hanover report

To a granite post marked L and H standing in the north easterly corner of Lebanon, and the south easterly corner of Hanover: and being the established corner bound of the four towns, Hanover, Canaan, Enfield and Lebanon, said bound stands near a board fence and a large maple tree.

1924 Enfield/Lebanon report

Across Mascoma Lake to a granite post marked L. H. C. E. standing in the north/east corner of Lebanon and the north/west corner of Enfield and being the established corner of the four towns, Lebanon, Enfield, Canaan, and Hanover, said bound stands near a board fence and a large maple tree.
